SILVERTON OPENS 1925 SCHOOL TERM

Double Shift Being Run to Accommodate Students of Burned Building

SILVERTON, Ore., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Silverton school opened again this morning after the Christmas holiday vacation. In order to accommodate the pupils who formerly attended classes in the Emerson building which burned to the ground shortly before Christmas, a double shift is being run in the Washington Irving building. Those attending class during the forenoon session have their gymnasium work in the afternoon, while those attending the afternoon session do their gymnasium work during the morning. All the studying must be done at home. Books are being furnished the pupils who lost theirs in the fire, by the school board. Many of the pupils will enter new classes in February and it was thought that the purchasing of a new set of books would be difficult for some of the parents. The school board bought as many old books as possible for the purpose. Some of the parents, it is understood purchase these books from the board.

On January 17th a special election will be held for the purpose of voting on the question of a bonded indebtedness in the sum of \$35,000 for the purpose of acquiring lands and the construction of an additional school building.
