

PASSENGER BOAT SERVICE STARTED

Inland Transportation Co. Announce Schedule; 75 People Accommodated

The first passenger carrying steamer to ply between Portland and Salem, for several years, will leave the dock of the Inland Transportation company, at the foot of Court street, Monday morning at 7 o'clock, according to advice given at the dock last night. From that date on, a passenger boat will leave the dock every Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings, bound for Portland. The same boat will carry passengers from Portland to Salem on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Sundays. The boat will lay over in Portland during Saturday.

The river boat Northwestern, captained by Fritz Kruse, has been fitted up and is in fine shape to handle as many as 75 passengers on each trip. Preparations have been made for the establishment of a good cuisine service on board the ship. Captain Kruse is an able, experienced ship master, and knows all of the bars and shoals between here and Portland, so a comfortable and pleasant trip is assured all passengers. It is expected that many tourists will avail themselves of this opportunity to enjoy a pleasant trip down the beautiful Willamette, past many scenic points of interest. Among the interesting places passed on the trip are, the end of the Old Oregon Trail; Champeo, where the decision that the northwest should become a part of the United States instead of Great Britain was made; and the locks at Oregon City.

The Northwestern will arrive at the Salem dock this morning. It carries a miscellaneous cargo from Portland consisting of one car of sugar, two cars of grapes, one car of alfalfa, and a shipment of machinery. The boat will be unloaded today, and a cargo of paper and miscellaneous freight will be loaded aboard tonight, so that the boat can start on its return trip Tuesday morning. The tonnage of the shipment arriving in Salem this morning totals 65 tons, and that for the return trip will amount to 125 tons. The capacity of the boat on its up stream trip is about 160 tons, and on the down stream trip 200 tons.

The channel between Salem and Portland was thoroughly dredged five years ago, and is still quite free except for an occasional snag. Appropriations from the state assure the keeping of the channel in good condition all of the year around, and no trouble is expected when low water season arrives.
