WE HAVE A LONG LEAD IN THE CORN INDUSTRY

The Salem district has a long lead in the corn industry i egon; Marion is the leading corn county in the Pacific Northvest, and Polk county is rapidly coming up to the point of naking a good second.

Marion county had 8200 acres in corn for the matured grain 1923, and produced 287,000 bushels; and Polk county had in orn for the same purpose that year 2800 acres, and produced 8,000 bushels. There was a 10 to 15 per cent increase last year, and will be another large increase this year; so, at the increased rice of corn, we produced in Salem's trading territory at least 500,000 worth last year, and will produce more this year-To say nothing of great tonnages of corn for soiling and age; far exceeding in acreage the amount grown for the

Our best farmers have concluded that the Salem district nd in fact the whole Willamette valley, is a very good corn ountry: that this depends upon the selection and acclimatizaon of seed, and upon the preparation of the seed bed and cultivation to hold moisture during dry seasons, and under the eadership of these men, and through other agencies, the wonlerful increase in corn growing has been brought about.


