

RILEY IS TALKED BY SERVICE CLUBS

Representatives of Each and Chamber of Commerce May Close Deal

Representatives of the Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions service clubs, the Realtors, and Chamber of Commerce met yesterday for a general discussion regarding the advisability of bringing Frank Branch Riley to Salem.

According to the figures pre-

sented, Mr. Riley will deliver an address here for \$250, but it is estimated that it will take an additional \$100 to pay for the expenses of a building and advertising. Some of the discussion centered around the selling of tickets at \$1 each in order to secure the necessary funds.

It is understood that he will be brought to this city soon after the adjournment of the legislature, to deliver his famous lecture, which he has given before large eastern audiences.

Last year the development bureau of the Portland Chamber of Commerce devoted \$10,000 in addition to the \$8,000 that was secured privately to provide funds to send the speaker east. He gave about 50 talks, making each one to cost about \$360 each.

HENRY RELEASED AFTER LONG WAIT

Month Spent in Jail While Officers Seek More Liquor Evidence

After languishing in jail for nearly a month while officers sought evidence which would connect him with bootlegging operations in Salem, A. Henry and William McMullin were released yesterday. Henry was arrested about three months ago on the H. R. Jones ranch and charged with the possession of a still.

It is alleged that the operations of Hansard and Miller, who staged an escape from the city jail recently, in which Hansard was captured in Portland while Miller made a get-away, were connected with the still possessed by Henry. The police, however, were unable to obtain conclusive evidence and as a result the man

was given his freedom. Hansard is confined in the city jail in the iron cage, where he was placed after a saw was discovered and bars on the window were cut.

Henry was given 90 days in jail and a \$100 fine, and McMullin finished serving a 10-day sentence for vagrancy, being sent up from Jefferson.
