CASH PRIZES ARE GIVEN IN CONTEST

Thrift Week in Schools Bring Opportunity to Win One of 28 Awards

A total of 28 cash prizes, amounting to \$65 will be distributed among Salem school children during Thrift Week by Salem banks who have placed the prizes up for competition.

The senior high school essays are limited to a maximum of 500 words; the ninth grade to 350 words; the seventh and eighth grades to 250 words; the fifth and sixth grades to 200 words; and the fourth grade essays are set at 150 words.

According to the rules that have been issued the essays should be written on good paper with pen and ink and only one side of the paper. The name of the writer should not be on the essay, but should be designated by some number.

The senior high school shall send in eight of the best essays and the junior high schools are to send in eight essays for each grade and the grade schools shall send four essays for each grade.

Five prizes will be offered for each group, ranging from \$5 to \$1 for the high school; from \$4 to \$1.50 for the junior high; from \$3.50 to \$1 for the eighth, seventh, sixth and fourth grades.

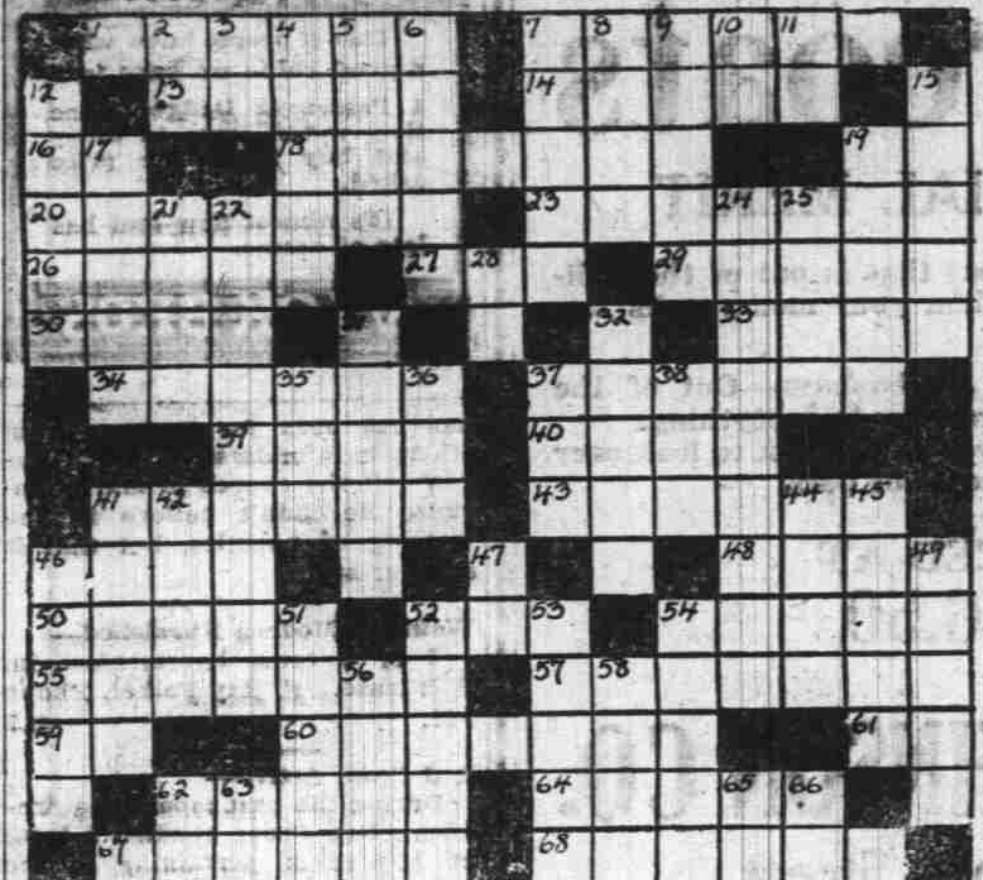

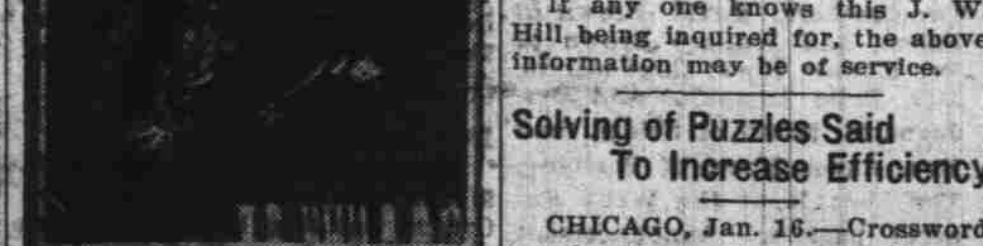
