

FLYING FINN MAKES RECORD

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—(By The Associated Press.)—Eazy Norumi, the flying Finn, established a world's record in a special 2000 meter event, the feature of the 102nd Engineers armory tonight. It was his third appearance in a meet in as many performances. His time for the 2000 meters was 5:33, a world's indoor record.

Norumi won the event with a lead of 25 yards over his nearest rival. Promoters of the meet in an endeavor to force Norumi to a record breaking performance gave his three rivals handicaps up to 150 yards. The Finn ran watch in hand and kept track of his progress at the end of every lap.

Salem investors purchased 410 shares in the association, upon which they paid partial payments amounting to \$630. About \$500 in commissions at the rate of \$1 a share were pocketed by the trio. The investors will not lose, it is said, but the association will bear the loss.

Plans for a \$10,000 building corporation, which was non-existent, was the bait used by the slippery three. A loan board was to be established in the city, with Joel Baumgartner as local agent. Promises of all the electrical work on houses built with money loaned in this district were made to the Fleener Electric company; H. W. Hatch, E. K. Dennison and L. H. Johnson, all of whom are engaged in the same line of business, Henry Carl, C. B. Adams, Cherry City Construction company and Carl Bahlborg, all contractors, were made a similar proposition. Graber Bros., E. S. Worden and J. A. Bernard were to have the exclusive plumbing rights.

When the pistol had been used was introduced into evidence. A few minutes later, during the testimony of a policeman, the room was darkened and a number of still pictures of the tragedy were thrown on a screen. The girl, sobbing wildly, sank into her chair and threw her arms around a policeman sitting next to her. Pictures showing the details of the fatal wound were also shown on the screen.

Earl Ellingson, brother of the girl, was the first witness. He placed responsibility of the murder on the girl's wild ways and her continual desire for excitement. He said she had acted in a most wayward manner ever since she was 12 years of age.

"At one time she disappeared for three days and was located in Turlock," he said. "Another time she disappeared for two days in San Francisco."

"I cannot say who is to blame. We made every effort to have her bring her friends of the night life to her home, but she seldom did so."

The girl's show of emotions today was the first since her arrest, when she shed a few tears upon being informed by the arresting officer that her mother was dead.

MODERN METHODS HELD CITY NEED

System of Caring for Garbage in Salem Obsolete Declares Local Man

"One of the most important needs of the city today is an incinerator to dispose of garbage," declared Rev. Martin Persephian, pastor of the Unitarian church, when interviewed by press representatives yesterday.

"It is an important matter and must be solved before Salem makes many more strides in her development. During the past five years this city has passed through a period of growth and development that is marvelous. It has not stopped growing, and will continue to do so for many years to come."

With a modern means of caring for garbage the city will not be bothered with the ravages of mice, rats and other health menaces that infest certain portions of the city, he said. It would be one means of combatting the earwig plague that has infested this part of the state.

An incinerator to care for the needs of this city could be secured for a small cost, compared to the danger that results with the primitive way of caring for the garbage here. Meadville, Pa., a city of about the same size as Salem, is equipped with a plant that can care for the refuse of its citizens. Consequently, the health standard of the city has been improved.

Salem cannot throw her garbage into the Willamette river because it would contaminate the water and be a serious health menace. Neither can the refuse be hauled away from the city to a dump because the city will in time grow and expand to include the present dump and refuse pile.

It would require but a few thousand dollars to construct the plant which would be large enough to care for the needs of Salem citizens five, ten and 15 years from this date.

TUESDAY IS SET FOR CAMPAIGN

Prominent Salem Women to Campaign for Funds to Conduct Local YWCA

Tuesday morning the YWCA campaign for \$6000, will be in full swing with more than 50 Salem women in the field for four days. Teams under the direction of Mrs. John J. Roberts, Mrs. Harry Hawkins, and Miss Mary Findley will raise the money that is absolutely necessary to carry on the present activities of the Salem organization. The budget which has been cut as far as possible is necessitated by the deficit of \$1000 from last year.

The amount required for the work of 1925 is divided between the estimated expenditures and the estimated receipts. The estimated expenditures are rent, \$2-256, salaries \$3150, telephone \$175, light \$250, national quota \$250, conference \$100, printing \$200 office supplies \$25 running expenses of headquarters \$350, replacements \$350, committees—Girl Reserves \$100, membership \$50, educational promotion \$100, tank fees \$350, miscellaneous \$100, food costs \$1639, making a total of \$9805.

The estimated receipts are food service \$1375, rooms \$2000, Girl Reserves and miscellaneous \$80, swimming fees \$350, a total of \$3805.

Consequently there is a budget difference of \$6000 that must be secured in order that the work may be carried on.

The women are to assemble at the YWCA Tuesday morning to get the various cards and at 10 o'clock devotional services will be held. Miss Alice H. Dodd, and Mrs. F. A. Elliot will speak.

RIVER VESSEL TO BE RAISED TODAY

Barges and Diver Arrive Saturday; Hull is Patched for Down Trip

The steamer "Relief," which went to the bottom of the Willamette river at the Court street dock will be raised to the top by tonight declared the workmen yesterday. Two barges were brought from Portland and placed on each side of the sunken hulk, while yesterday a diver dug five heavy chains underneath the vessel in preparations to lifting the hulk this afternoon.

Curtiss Brothers of Portland who are handling the job are confident that the Relief can be brought to the surface, canvas patches placed on the outside of the hull and bulwarks made on the inside. It is probable that the steamer could then go down the river on her own power. This will probably be the cause, if the boiler and engines are uninjured by the crush of ice that rammed the hull of the ship during the recent cold snap.

The Northwestern, which replaced the Relief on the Willamette river will arrive in Salem tonight with a cargo of more than 100 tons. In the cargo there is a carload of flour, sugar, wire fencing, three carloads of grocer-

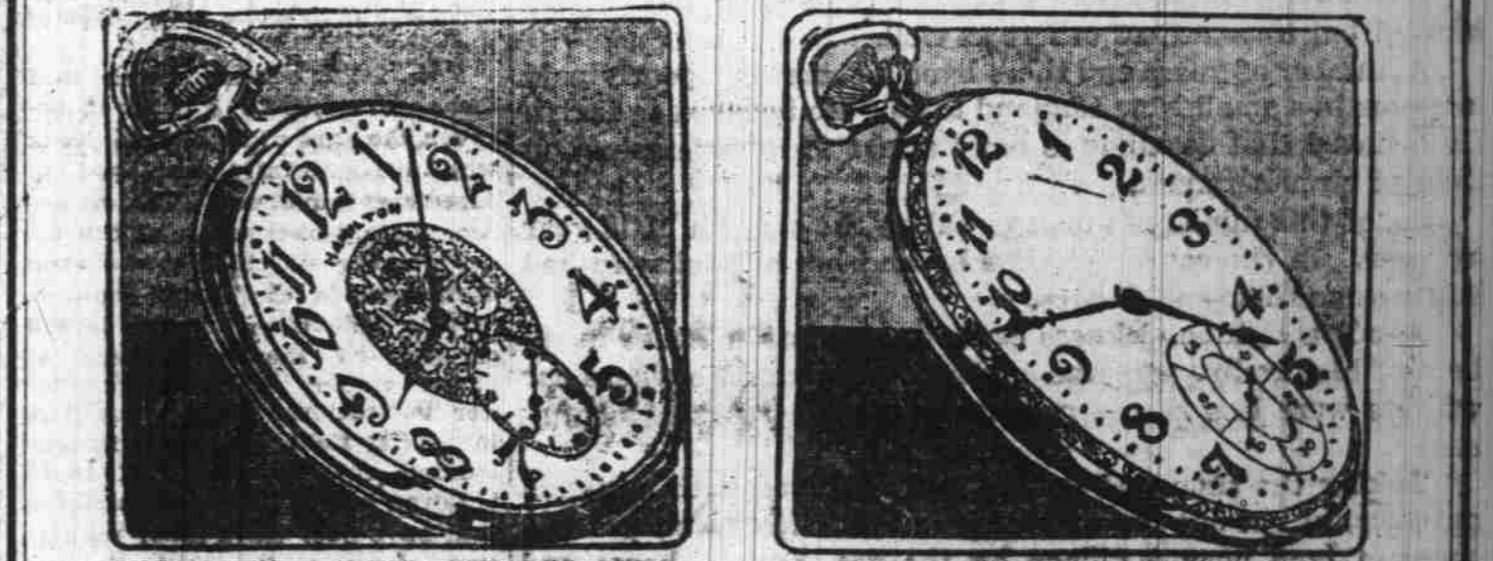

SEATTLE, Jan. 17.—Canon William H. Bliss, who died tonight in New York City, was rector of the Trinity parish Episcopal church in Seattle. Previous to coming here 10 years ago, he was canon of the All-Saints Cathedral in Spokane.

In 1920 Canon Bliss organized the White Cross society, an association which has received national and international recognition for its campaign against narcotics. He was reelected president of the organization for the fourth time while attending an opium conference at Geneva, Switzerland, as an unofficial observer.
