An act creating a game refuge in Klamath and Jackson counties, approximating 7,000 acres, and beginning at the intersection of the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway and the Topsy grade, is urged in HB No. 105, sponsored by the game committee. Under provisions of the bill it would be unlawful to hunt any game bird or animal in the refuge.

From the Topsy Grade road the line would run southwesterly in the direction of the California line; west along the Oregon-California line to Jenny creek; north along the creek to the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway, and then easterly to the point of origin.
