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OREGON DAIRYMEN HOLD CONFERENCE

C. W. McLaughlin, of Astoria, Elected President of Association

McMINNVILLE, Or., Jan. 23.—C. W. McLaughlin of Astoria, was elected president of the Oregon Dairymen's association here today at the closing session of the annual conference of that organization. Recommendations that Astoria be selected for the location of the next year's conference are expected to be acted on favorably by the executive committee. The other officers elected were: H. W. Cooley, Jefferson, first vice president; Fred Bonedrake, Roseburg, second vice president; P. M. Brandt, Corvallis, secretary-treasurer; Horace Addis, Portland, assistant secretary; Chester L. Mulkey, McMinnville, chairman of the legislative committee. A dozen resolutions were passed this afternoon, summing up the developments of the conference. Representative Harry E. Tucker, of Linn county, was endorsed for United States secretary of agriculture in one resolution. To complete their protest against the stand taken by Dr. Fredrick Stricker, secretary of the state board of health, the association passed a resolution not favoring his "model milk ordinance," and especially relating to "reconstructed" milk. One resolution asks the legislature to continue the appropriation for investigation of dairy cattle diseases as conducted under the auspices of Oregon Agricultural college.

Central Sales Organization Plans Progressing Rapidly

Marketing experts of the Portland Chamber of Commerce and OAC report continued progress toward organization of central sales organization for canneries and creameries, both branches operating to consolidate the interests of their respective commodities. In the case of canneries it is pointed out the objectives in view are standardization of pack, joint inspection, and increased sales efficiency at reduced cost. Butter standardization, cream grading and central control of surplus, provide some of the reasons for "cooperation among the cool" operative and community owned canneries interested in the plan. Minnesota cooperative creameries through cream grading have greatly raised the standard of butter, it being reported that 46 per cent of October 1924 sales was 93 and 94 score. Three per cent surplus of butter resulted in a 25 per cent decrease in total value, it is stated by Mr. Kipp manager of

the marketing department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. A joint meeting of the Mt. Angel and St. Paul creameries has been called at St. Paul to consider affiliation with central organization. Some creameries have already made favorable decisions, according to Mr. Kipp.

HOME OWNING IS HELD IMPORTANT

Representative Woodward Urges Young Men to Marry School Teachers

"Creating a home is one of the best ways to develop the fundamental principles of democracy," declared William F. Woodward, representative from Multnomah county, in speaking before the realtors at their regular meeting at the Marlon hotel yesterday. "The home is the basis of democracy, and back of it is based the scheme of education, all tending and creating a common interest," he said. "It is a well known fact that true citizenship is not based upon the dollar, and those with great wealth are not one whit better than the man who is rearing a family and is not listed on the tax rolls. Education that makes citizenship a task and a duty is necessary and in that very thing points to the ownership of a home. "Young men, when in doubt marry a schoolmarm," Mr. Woodward said in his address yesterday. "The planning of a home, the seriousness of the occasion, causes it to be the finest game that a young man could ever play, the outlining of a program for home building." Another speaker, W. S. Baker, who is here in the interest of the bird life of the nation, gave a few impressions of early educational efforts in the attempt to secure text books legislation. F. J. Rupert, newly-elected president of the organization, presided at the noon meeting of the realtors.

Boardman to Leave Sunday For Physical Men's Meet

The physical directors' association of the northwest is to meet in Tacoma, February 2, for their annual convention. Representatives from Oregon, Washington, and Idaho are to gather there. A program for two days has been arranged. An outstanding physical director, George B. Stock head of the National Physical Directors work of the YMCA, with offices in New York City, is to be the main speaker. Bob Boardman, local physical director, is to leave Sunday for that city. Enroute he will visit Everett, Seattle, and other places in order to inspect gymnasiums to secure ideas for the new gymnasium to be erected here.

BURGLAR SUSPECT NOW BEING HELD

Ruffe, Unable to Furnish \$2500 Bail; Owner of Automobile Sought.

Lee Ruffe, who was captured by Officers Wiles and Olsen, near the Fairgrounds, was held over on a \$2500 bail, after a preliminary hearing before Brazier C. Small, justice of the peace, yesterday. In his possession was found a kit of burglary tools, and a jimmy which he possessed exactly fitted a hole in the door of the Doe Grocery store near the Fairgrounds. Ruffe was arrested and brought to the police station and while there report came in that the store had been burglarized, and officers succeeded in arresting the man even before the robbery was reported. The car in which Ruffe was driving while arrested is still held by the police and the identity of the owner cannot be discovered.

Game Committee Seeking To Preserve Diamond Lake

Petition to hold Diamond Lake and sufficient land in the Umpqua national forest, for the propagation of fish and any act which might deprive the state of the free use of the water would inflict irreparable damage upon the state, is made in House Joint memorial No. 3, introduced yesterday by the game committee. The memorial points out that the state has stocked the lake with rainbow trout and that since that time it has developed into one of the greatest fishing lakes in the world. Upon its banks is the greatest rainbow trout egg-taking station on the continent, producing annually in excess of 17,000,000 eggs. Copies of the memorial will be sent to the Oregon delegation in congress.

Pomona Grange Opposes Change in Enforcement

Any change in the state prohibition department and the state market agent's department which may be brought about by legislation, is not desired by Marion County Pomona grange, according to resolutions passed. The grange has also gone on record favoring the bills to place the justice of the peace and constable of the Salem district on flat salaries and, in addition, opposed the diversion of the state market road fund to other uses. The grange thinks that the present prohibition officials are conducting the campaign for liquor enforcement and do not want a change that would decrease the enforcement power of the organization. They also state that the market agent has been doing good work and want to see his continue to protect the interests of the producer.

Total Number of Orientals in Marion County Listed

The number of Japanese in Marion county is given in the 11th Biennial report of the bureau of labor, issued by C. H. Gram, commissioner. There are 63 males, 52 females, and 87 children under the ages of 16 in the county. They own property assessed value with improvements \$89,230 and the total real value of property owned and leased in Marion county by the Japanese amounts to \$114,160. There are 52 males, 12 females and 33 children in the

county and they own property to the actual value of \$135,100.

The total figures of the actual value of property in Marion county owned and leased by Japanese and Chinese amount to \$251,260, according to the figures furnished in the Chamber of Commerce bulletin.

Two Fish Bills Offered For Approval of Solons

Two fish regulating measures were introduced in the house yesterday. H. B. No. 114, by Representative King, would prohibit seining in the Coquille river, and H. B. No. 116, by Representative Peirce and others, regulates trolling in the Rogue river. A limit of two salmon a day is set.

PROPOSE CHANGE IN MARRIAGE LAW

Female Contracting Party Would Not Need to Be Resident of County

Designed to clear certain technicalities that exist under present conditions, HB No. 120, introduced yesterday by the Multnomah county delegation, would provide for the issuance of marriage licenses in any county provided that the ceremony is provided in the county in which the license is granted. Under the proposed law a woman would not have to be a resident of the county, as is required at present. The bill, suggested by County Clerk Beveridge of Multnomah county, is needed in Portland in particular. Many men working in that city have their fiancées come to Portland; register at a hotel and give the hotel as their address when obtaining a license. The new law would make such evasion unnecessary and at the same time would help to block the ever-increasing stream of marriage license applicants which exist between Portland and Vancouver, Wash.

Normal School Funds Sought By Delegation

An appropriation of \$72,000 in addition to that prescribed by law is sought by the Polk county delegation to the legislature for the Oregon State Normal school at Monmouth. The money would be used for payment of salaries and maintenance for the two years beginning January 1, 1925. The measure was introduced yesterday as H. B. No. 124.

Penalty Placed for Meeting Mickey Walker in Any Match

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—The penalty for boxing Mickey Walker, world's welterweight champion, who is in disfavor with the New York state athletic commission, will be six months suspension in this state, the commission determined today. This measure will go into effect immediately and will be retroactive. Under the new ruling Bobby Barrett of Philadelphia, and Jack Malone of St. Paul, who have been under the ban in this state for engaging in a match with Walker, will be reinstated, together with their managers, and Lew Tendler of Philadelphia and Jack Zivic of Pittsburgh, will be placed under the ban.

"Family Night" to Continue Manager of Grand States

"Family Night" is to be a regular weekly attraction at the Grand theater hereafter, and on that one night of each week entire families will be admitted on a single ticket, the price of which is 50 cents. It makes no difference how big the family, they all get in for half a dollar, says Manager Stille. Instruments filed with the recorder number 7916, as against the 7977 for 1923. For 1924, 2801 of the instruments filed were for deeds, and 1699 were mortgages.

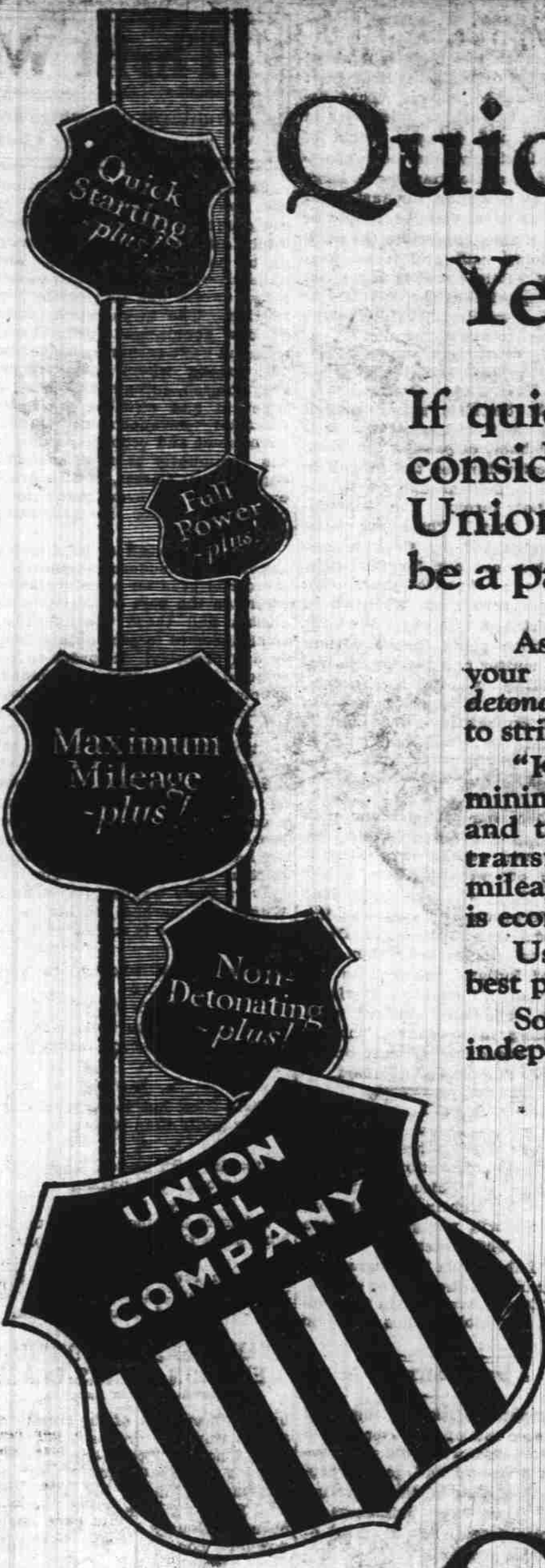
