

CHARLIE DAWSON WINS DECISION IN BATTLE WITH GARDEAU

EUGENE BOXER IGNORES FOUL

Opportunity to Claim Decision Passed Up; Match Makes Hit With Fans

In an exhibition of gameness and setting an example that was over the comprehension of the general run of ham-and-egg fighters, Charlie Dawson, of Eugene, twice passed up an opportunity to claim his fight with Billy Gardeau, of Portland last night, and battled his way to a decision over his opponent, two judges and the referee making the award. The decision was popular with a majority of the fans and even before it was announced the army was filled with cries for "Dawson."

Gardeau opened slow, feeling his way carefully and taking several punches to his jaw. Dawson proved the quicker of the pair and while he landed the greater number of blows through the 10 rounds, though these were not as forceful as those landed by Gardeau. The Portland fighter was handicapped, having fought a 10-round fight in Portland Thursday night.

In the second round Gardeau's glove slid off Dawson's and struck a little low. Dawson ignored the blow and proceeded about his business. In the fourth round Dawson was dropped to his knee by a hard punch below the belt line, but rose and protested the referee's move to award him the fight on a foul. No one would have objected had the fight terminated there.

Dawson was badly worried and slowed up by the blow for the entire remainder of the round and the fifth. In the sixth it became evident that he was recovering and regaining confidence while Gardeau showed unmistakable signs of losing his confidence. By the seventh Dawson's missing grin had returned and he ducked Gardeau's heavy ones. Gardeau began working hard for a knockout in the ninth and blows exchanged were about even. Dawson finished the tenth and final round working away at Gardeau, who was unable to land the sleep-producing touch.

George Hennings, of Camas, Wash., the "Terrible Swede," took a lot of punishment from Spike Crossan, of Salem, for five rounds and then in the final frame, apparently getting stronger as the minutes rolled by, managed to show enough stuff in the last round to win for himself the referee's decision. The hard-hitting Spike and his brand new red pants were not enough to break down the Swede's morale.

An four-act comedy entitled O'Leary vs Lon Perry, both of Portland, did not arouse much en-

thusiasm. The tall "tan" fighter had it all over his opponent but did not register, permitting the fight to end in a draw. O'Leary did not offer near the stuff he did in a previous appearance here.

In the curtain raisers Herb Little, of Independence and Lefty Worden, of Molalla, went two rounds and a fraction, the fight being given to Lefty at the beginning of the third round. The Fox twins, of Independence, were highly received in a short exhibition match.

Steve Hanns, of Eugene, was the referee.

Mack Lillard, of Portland, challenged any 130-pounder on the coast while Tommy Carter, of Seattle, claiming 142 pounds, challenged the winner of the Dawson-Gardeau fight. Dawson announced his weight as 142 and Gardeau 145 pounds.

County Judge Hunt Offers Remedy for Dog Licenses

It costs more to collect dog licenses now than is secured under the present system, declared County Judge J. T. Hunt, and action should be taken to remedy the existing conditions. More money is paid out trying to collect the license fees and to pay for sheep killed, than is realized under the fund.

The judge proposes a change from the present law which cause the same license to be paid, but at the end of 60 days from the time collections start, all who have not purchased licenses will be subjected to a double license fee. This could be enforced much easier than the present system is handled and better results secured.

Under the present law a fine of \$10 is assessed against non-paying dog owners, but with the present conditions it is almost impossible
