England Aids Australia To Care for Immigrants

MELBOURNE, Jan. 25.—The British government will advance Australia approximately \$5,000,000 for every 14,000 immigrants sent to Australia from England, according to an agreement recently concluded between the British treasury officials and Australia.

Great Britain has agreed also to contribute to the cost of receiving depots to be established in the various states. Australia expects to borrow a total of \$170,000,000 for migration purposes.

The New South Wales government has recently accepted the offer of \$2,500,000 for fostering immigration. This money will be advanced in London as required.

Period of Distrust Gives Way To Trend of Elating; Harmony Reached

GENEVA, Jan. 23.—(By The Associated Press.)—The wave of distrust and despair which engulfed Geneva for the past few days over the opium controversy has been succeeded by a trend of elation and optimism equally as extreme as the previous apprehension.

German Work May Protect Paris Against Seine Floods

PARIS, Jan. 25.—To Germany may revert the task of protecting Paris from the inundations of the Seine recurring every few years, plans for the curbing of which have been under study since the days of Henry IV.

Victor Pytral, minister of public works, replying to a suggestion from M. Emile Brisson, president of the general council of the Seine Department, that "Germany cooperate in the execution of great works of public utility," replied as follows:

"I have the honor to inform you that following the London agreement the question of the cooperation of Germany in the execution of public works has been reopened and the conditions under which Germany could make certain deliveries in kind, the amount of which would be placed to the credit of its reparations account, are being examined anew."

"It is not possible for me at present to tell you to what extent the work of protecting Paris and its suburbs against the inundations of the Seine would benefit by these deliveries, but you may be assured that the matter will be studied thoroughly and that my administration is resolved to do everything possible to hasten the solution of the problem."

M. Brisson's plan provided for deliveries from Germany of steel and iron girders and other articles destined to form the structure of reinforced concrete walls, to be built along the river banks from Champigny, 10 miles east of Paris, to Arzangeuil, about the same distance to the west.
