WELFARE WORKER THREATENS COURT

Speedy Trip to Put Bill Before Legislature Interrupted By Officer

"You have not heard the last of this," was the promise made to Brazier C. Small, justice of the peace, after he had fined W. C. Kenyon of Portland \$10 for speeding on the Pacific highway.

The promise was made by one of the women riding in Kenyon's machine, and was accompanied by a direful wagging of the forefinger. The woman is particularly interested in girl welfare, and in order to place her problems before the present legislature, an especially speedy trip to Salem seemed to be indicated. O. O. Nichols, state traffic officer, interrupted the errand, and filed charges against Kenyon for traveling 40 miles an hour.

Indignation was registered when the girl welfare worker appeared in justice court. Preliminary to the hearing, information was sought as to whether Mr. Small was possessed of a kindly and benevolent personality, or was made of the sterner stuff.

Judge Small, while agreeing that a certain amount of haste is necessary in legislative matters, was forced to state that speed be moderated to a great extent, in order to prevent possible complications. In short, that a fine of ten dollars seemed to be in order, as indicated by a perusal of the statute books.

"You have not heard the last of this," echoed through the corridors, as the indignant welfare worker made her departure. She is said to have stated that she would see to it that Marion county would derive little consideration from any program she was contemplating. In short, that for spite she would let Marion county work out its own welfare.
