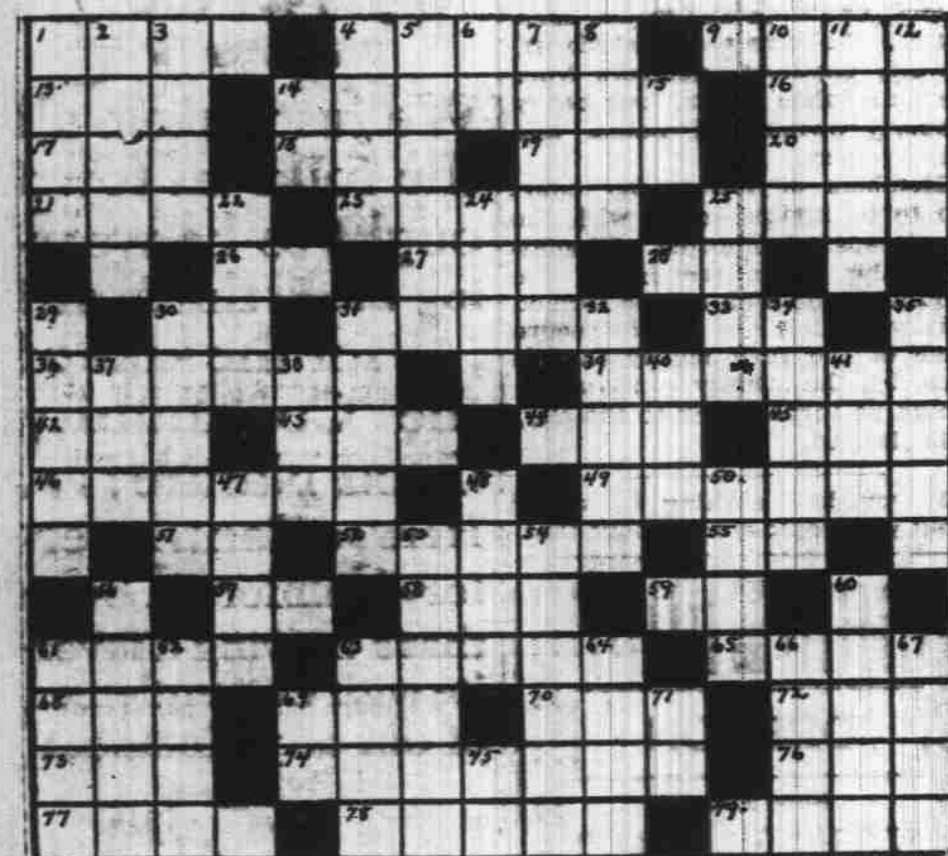

The name of the judge has not been announced.

INCOME TAX ISSUE GIVEN

(Continued from Page 2) incomes accruing to them from the earnings of corporations, partnerships and trusts, whether such earnings were distributed or not.

The act would embody safeguards to cover the liability of trusts, etc., with proper exemptions for banks, now taxed in the full legal way. The act would not tax corporations as that method results in double taxation, but would tax the real earning of the corporation to the individual and require the corporation to file a return, as it does with the federal government, and to show its earnings in Oregon and its stockholders with their holdings, with all information at the source.

The act would allow all usual deductions, except property taxes paid in Oregon, which would be deductible by neither partnership, fiduciary, corporation nor individual, but, the individual taxpayer would be entitled to apply all the Oregon property tax paid by him, and his pro rata of any Oregon property tax paid by any partnership, corporation or trust from credit against the income tax assessed. It would also follow a reciprocal offset to a non-resident taxpayer taxed on income in the state in which he resides providing his state allowed residents of this state a similar credit.

This law as proposed would cost not to exceed three and one-half per cent of the net collections annually to put into effect and administer. The administration features would be similar to the old law but with weak features strengthened and would charge the tax commissioner solely with its administration with a board of appeal consisting of the Attorney General and the state tax commissioner.

It would provide for two deputy commissioners to be appointed by the commissioner with the usual provisions for agents, inspectors and clerical help. The net collections to reduce the state levy and the state levy would be limited to one mill unless specially authorized by the people. One mill is left for emergency. No state levy would be needed. The payment of all the tax to be made to the commissioner with a periodic accounting to the treasurer and a balance at all times for refunds.

The plan would produce rather more than \$2,000,000. You say how can it when it allows as an offset the entire Oregon property tax paid. But it does not quite do that. It is framed so that unit a business earns more than eight percent on its taxable investment, that business can levy the property tax as levied, but when the earnings of that business exceed eight per cent of its taxable investment, the income tax begins to take off his profit.

But it goes much farther than that. It recognizes the fact that the man with an income, but with no investment in taxable property, either personally or through a corporation or partnership, derives the same benefits from our schools, roads and institutions and the same protection from our government as the property owner. But the property owner is building up our state while the receiver of income from other sources of Oregon is living off our resources and giving nothing in return.

This law makes him pay his proper proportion, no more and no less. No law can be absolutely perfect, but what fault can any reasonable person find with a law that not only takes double tax burden from the overtaxed property and measures a man's tax by his ability to pay.

Money cannot be legislated into a pocket but legislation can be framed that does not attempt to take money from an empty pocket. From the income tax statistics, it is definitely shown that there is sufficient income within the state of Oregon, that is not paying its just portion of tax, to make this law produce rather more than two million dollars to the state.

You say the rates are high, ten to thirty per cent. But are they, and does the rate really matter? Oregon must raise forty million by taxation.

With our present plan, even though a man's tax takes ninety per cent of his income for the year, or a sum much greater than his income, yet that forty million must be raised.

With this plan it can take no more than 25 per cent of any man's net income until that man has a net income of over ninety-five thousand dollars and pays no property tax in Oregon whatsoever, and Oregon has no taxpayers of this description.

Neither are they high on the lower rates of income. Exemptions should be \$750 for a single person, Why? Because \$750 is an income sufficient to maintain a single person, and a single person with a net income of \$1000 who pays no property tax should pay his state \$25 annually and self afford to do so.

The rate is not high on the man with an income of five thousand dollars. The income tax on that amount with no property offset, allowing him \$2000 exemption as a married man, is but \$300. The country builder who has a net income of \$5000 would have an investment in his community of \$10,000 taxable property and be paying more than \$400 taxes. Can we afford to penalize the best citizen we have by saying, through our tax system, because you have made our community a better place to live in, because you have built up our schools and churches and made living safe through governmental functions, you must pay all the cost of maintaining those institutions?

When the late income tax law was passed, some farsighted legislators tried to have a real property tax offset inserted and endeavored to have corporations exempted. But having no statistics available, they could not show that such a plan would produce sufficient tax. The cry was also raised against exemptions of corporations with the mistaken idea that corporations and individuals are separate entities in fact as well as in law.

A corporation is simply an artificial person made up of several individuals, and when you tax the individual upon income, you tax the corporation. Business cannot stand double taxation nor do we want to discourage corporations. Without combinations of capital, no large undertaking is possible. Were it not for corporations we would still be reading by tallow candles and traveling in horse drawn vehicles over corduroy roads.

The rate is not so high on a man with a taxable income of \$50,000, his income tax would be \$11,150 even if he had no property tax offset. A man with invested capital of \$500,000 giving it all his time and attention, would deem himself fortunate to clear \$50,000 on his investment, yet his property tax would be forty mills on sixty per cent of \$500,000, or \$12,000, \$850 greater even with the income tax law in effect, on the community builder than on the man who lives off the community and makes no improvement in it.

You ask why the graduated tax is not the flat rate? The answer is this. As incomes increase so does the ability of the recipient to increase to invest in and build up his state; and if he finds that on account of taxation it pays him better to do so, he too, will become a builder. This tax will produce more than \$2,000,000 which conclusion is reached through the following calculation. Oregon has, under the exemptions quoted, i. e., \$750 for a single person and \$200 for the head of a family, the following taxable incomes of the character named.

of \$50,000,000, who paid \$500,000 and their property tax offset would be less than \$1,500,000. The individual who suffered under the old law will find this proposed measure covers every objection that could be made.

Analyze it as you will, it will bear any test as a reasonable taxing measure and would be entitled—"THE PROPERTY TAX LIMITATION ACT" as it limits the state levy thus forcing property tax reduction.

Editorials of the People

TRAPPING BEAVER Editor Statesman: I would like to say a few words in regard to the beaver question which is before the legislature.

I have lived in a community where there were beaver for the past twenty-four years and last winter and this winter have been trying my hand at trapping them. Like most of the other fellows who tried it I was a green hand at the game and had a lot to learn.

During the trapping season of 1923 and 1924 I caught seven beaver, five of them out of one big colony which I know had been there for twenty-four years, there were still beaver left there when the trapping season closed. After the close of the trapping season the tenant on the land tore out the dam and was able to keep it out and as a result I will venture to say that he had at least fifteen acres of good pasture land all spring, summer and fall which had not been out of water in the past eighteen years.

Beaver are about as intelligent as the ordinary run of human beings. If two or three are taken from one colony in quick succession the other members of the colony will move pronto. From the 20th of last November until January 25th I was not able to find a fresh beaver sign on my trapping grounds. Since the 8th of this month I have been seeing fresh signs there and have caught one 56 pound beaver and one coming two year old. Are the beavers anywhere near exterminated? Let's see.

During the 1923 and 1924 seasons I did not catch a kitten or coming two year old beaver. My friends who traps on part of the same water with me did not catch a kitten and caught one coming to year old. To date this winter I have caught six beavers, one a coming two year old accidentally caught a kitten on a muskrat set. Where have all the beaver kittens raised in the spring of 1923 and 1924 gone to? We have not caught them out of our beaver water. Waters which were infested with beaver two years ago are still infested and small lakes and creeks which were not infested two years ago are today infested.
