EDITORIALS OF THE PEOPLE
Commends Our Legislature
Editor Oregon Statesman:
I wish to commend our legisla-

ture for its efforts to reduce the cost of government by placing constables and justices of the peace on a flat salary. The fee system is not only expensive but it is the source of many evils in the administration of law. Fees collected by officials are as much a part of our taxes for governmental sacrifice as though paid to the tax collector, and as a rule are a much heavier tax on productive industry.

I wish to suggest that while the legislature is adjusting the constables and justices of the peace to a flat salary basis as a matter of economy in expenses but as an aid to better and more efficient service, it give attention to other departments suffering from the same cause—fee collecting.

We have in Salem a city physician, a city health officer, a county health officer and a school doctor. Most of these officials are employed on a fee basis. Each is a practicing physician and in private practice aside from his official position. Except on rare occasions the duties of all of these officials may easily be performed by one physician giving his entire time to the duties and working on a flat salary. In case of epidemics or emergencies such an official should be given such assistance as necessary, to meet the emergency. Such an official would be free to perform his official duties without fear of unfavorable reaction on his private practice. In cases of contagious diseases he would proclaim and enforce quarantine regulations and take such measures as were legal and necessary to protect the public health without the fear of offending a profitable patron of his private practice.

While the legislature is interested along the line of reducing taxes by reducing the number of tax eaters and by surrounding officials with conditions which produce more efficient service there are many places it might find

where a duplication of official duties might be reduced to a single official to the profit of the tax payers. A budget charged with co-ordinating the duties is found to exist, would be able to save the tax payers of Oregon more money than the budget committee charged with determining the financial needs of the various offices.

The fee system is vicious in principle. It leads directly to many evils. It results in maladministration of law as often as to the administration of it. It fosters abuse of official corruption of authority, and is a heavy tax on industry. Every office, state, county, city, should be placed upon a direct flat salary basis.

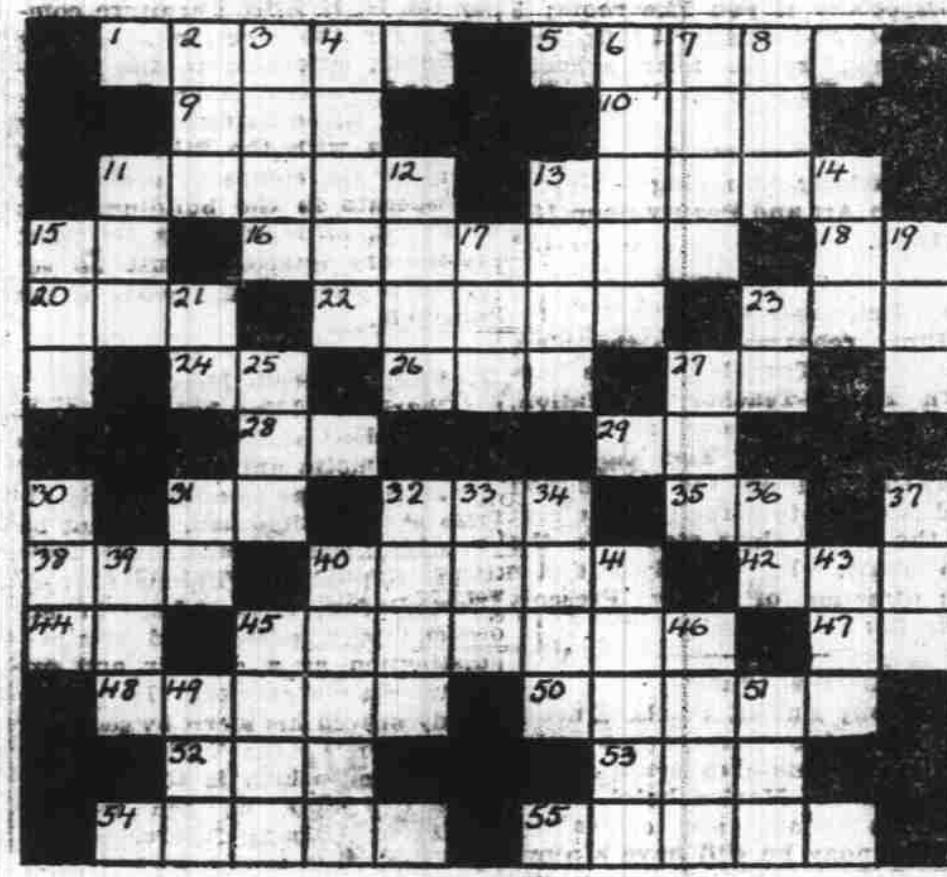
The Hickman family recently moved out of our district, to Salem. The school will miss the four Hickman young folks.
