The third in the series of the outstanding photoplays "in which is seen the making of a great nation" will be shown next Friday and Saturday, February 13 and 14, at the Liberty theater. This film, following "Columbus" and "Jamestown" is "Vincennes," the three reel drama which depicts with vividness and accuracy, the opening of the Northwest. The photoplay is adapted to the screen from "The Old Northwest," written by Frederick Austin Ogg with the cast including, of course, such personages as George Rogers Clark, Patrick Henry, Governor Hamilton, Francis Vigo, and Captain Leonard Helm.

The synopsis gives the following facts: This is the drama of the tremendous undertaking of George Rogers Clark, boldest of Virginia's pioneers, in pushing on, in the dead of winter, over 200 miles of what everyone said were impassable trails, taking the British by surprise and driving them out of the Northwest. This tremendous achievement resulted in five more states—Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan—being added to the American Republic.

In 1777, while the Thirteen American Colonies were fighting Great Britain in the east, the Indians were encouraged to take the warpath by the British along the Republic's western borders. This endangered the lives of eastern colonists eager to push westward, where a man could pick and choose his acres. George Rogers Clark appealed to Patrick Henry, Governor of Virginia, for money

to finance an expedition to drive out the British. They proceeded to Kaskaskia, which was occupied without a fight. There they founded a permanent settlement, which later became Louisville. In the winter of 1778, knowing that Hamilton's Indians would surely attack them in the spring when the trails opened, Clark and his men decided on a surprise attack. The small band marched over 240 miles of wilderness, starved and frozen, but ever encouraged to go on by the indomitable spirit of Clark, and their success was greater than they had dared hope for.

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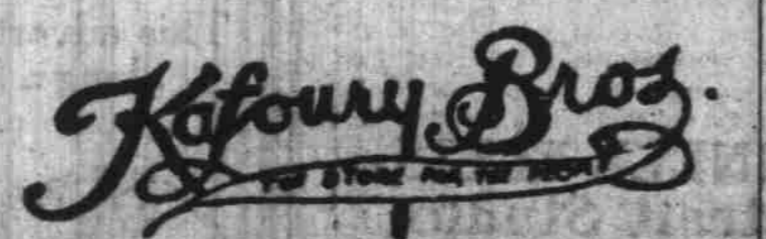
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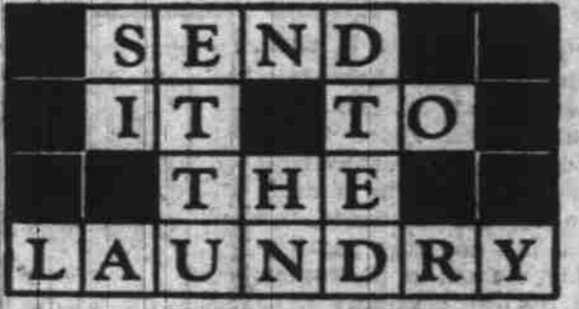
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
