BITS FOR BREAKFAST

Queer world— We are all a little queer— And everything is more or less awry.

Take the parking ordinance in Salem. In order to help business, the city council framed and passed this ordinance, requiring among other things that on the busy down town streets a car must not remain parked in one place for more than one hour. That seems the proper thing. It is designed to curb the selfishness of the parking hog, who puts his car in front of a place of business and leaves it there, regardless of the rights of other people—especially of the rights of those who want to drive up and do business there. But no general law can be administered, however. Just on the whole, that does not injure some one. On Wednesday afternoon a man from the country drove into Salem and parked his car near the foot of a stairway leading to a doctor's office. The man was sick. His wife was with him. But the doctor as busy. There was a waiting crowd. The sick man with the parked car had to await his turn. It was a few minutes over the hour, not to exceed ten minutes, when the sick man finally got back to his car—and it was tagged by a traffic policeman. So the sick man and his wife had to go

to the city recorder's office. Likely they were obliged to pay a fine. Perhaps a dollar, with a warning that the next time it will be \$5 or more.

Now, that traffic policeman did right. It was his business to see to the enforcement of the law. He did not know the owner of the car was sick. He did not know he was unavoidably detained. The people of Salem do not want to appear as harsh and mean and grasping; as taking the poor sick man's dollar away from him; and more especially as branding the poor sick man and his wife as criminals, law breakers. This was the first time they were ever arrested. Still, that ordinance is right, and it would be of no service if it were not enforced. All the people have a right to the use of the parking spaces down town, and not some parking space hog for some particular parking space.
