OUR BEET-SUGAR FACTORIES We are to have beet sugar factories in Salem, and in all the Willamette valley cities and towns that can furnish the labor for thinning and harvesting the beets.

In this connection the following excerpts taken from an interview in New York with Lord Invernairn a few days ago are interesting; he being one of the active figures in the development of the British beet sugar industry now under way.

"We feel that at last we are in a fair way to establish the production of beet sugar on a stable and permanent foundation in Britain. Why it was not done long ago is hard to say. The war really opened the eyes of Englishmen to the danger they ran through being wholly dependent upon foreign countries for their sugar supply.

Lord Invernairn goes on to tell of at least ten new or projected beet sugar factories in Great Britain; one of them near Edinburgh in Scotland, others in Spaulding in Lincolnshire, one in the West Midlands, one at Ely, another at Ipswich, Suffolk, and one at Bury St. Edmunds, Suffolk.

The British government gives a bounty on home grown sugar, lasting for ten years, on a gradually diminishing scale.

For the manufacturing and also for the growing of the beets. The basis for growing is 44 shillings per long ton for beets of 15.5 per cent sugar content.

The bounties are for the purpose of getting a home produced supply of sugar; to aid in reviving agriculture, and to help dispose of the unemployment situation.

We can have the same benefits in this country without bounties; by maintaining the present protective tariff duties. If this could be absolutely guaranteed, there would be

no doubt whatever of the United States before long becoming self sufficient in sugar.— Though that would take a vast increase in home grown tonnage.— For our consumption has grown to nearly 5,500,000 tons, and we made only a little over a million tons of beet sugar last year.
