Michigan again ranked second in this pack with a total of 34,194 cases. This state packed 405,151 cases of loganberries while Washington came second with 298,197 cases.

Marion county is a historical center as disclosed by the Chamber of Commerce bulletin. We have Champeog, greatest historical spot in the northwest, the place where Oregon was saved to the United States; the Jason Lee home in Salem, the oldest church in Oregon at St. Paul; an Indian settlement in the northwest was creek named near Turner. Just north of Salem the first American settlement in the northwest was made in 1812, while the second settlement was made two miles south of Newberg, on the Marion county side.
