SENATOR MILLER GIVES ADDRESS

Washington's Birthday is Fittingly Observed in Salem High School

Washington's birthday was fittingly observed with a musical program at the Salem high school yesterday morning.

During the special ceremonies that were held in the high school auditorium, numbers were rendered by the school orchestra, under the leadership of Lena Belle Tartar.

Another feature of the entertainment was the double quartet. The final number was given by the assembly, in singing the "Star Spangled Banner."

Senator Edward W. Miller of Grants Pass made one of the most outstanding addresses ever made at the Salem high school.

He presented the character of Washington in a way that was readily grasped by the student body. The address, however, was of a profound nature, and showed a deep study of the character of the first president of the United States.

"George Washington embodied the ideals of America," Senator Miller said in part. "He embodied those ideals in a manner which no other American has ever equaled."

The quality of his character should be emulated by every young man in America and in the world. The fundamentals of that character were reverence and devotion—the two things that you will find that predominate in the makeup of every truly great man.

I earnestly appeal to you young people to give serious thought to that reverence and devotion to duty which George Washington evidenced, and which constituted, in the main, the standard of his good citizenship—a standard that no man in all the succeeding generations of Americans has surpassed."
