process of law as a result of the investigation into the death of young Billy McClintock."

"However," continued Mr. Crowe, "we have evidence, which in my judgment makes it necessary to hold Mr. Shepherd.

"I am prepared to file a formal complaint against him if it becomes necessary to keep him in custody."

Attorney William Scott Stewart said that his client "technically is entitled to discharge at this time," but rather than "precipitate a charge of murder, we want to give Mr. Crowe time to look carefully into the case."

Stewart pointed out that Shephord voluntarily returned from New Mexico for the coroner's inquest into McClintock's death, had appeared voluntarily for questioning at any time and had never claimed his constitutional rights to resist examination.
