

## REV. CHAS. POLING LECTURES TONIGHT

Great Interest Aroused by Sermons; Needs of Church Outlined

Rev. Charles Poling of Ridge-way, Pa., gave a special address at the First Presbyterian church yesterday evening on the subject: "The Church's Greatest Need."

"The church's greatest need is not money," Dr. Poling declared. "Any church devoting its energies properly, and fulfilling the spiritual needs of its people, will not lack in funds to carry on its work."

"More members is not the greatest need of the church; many churches now have more people in them than can be fully accommodated."

"The one great need—the thing of paramount importance—is that the old members, the members already in the church, be revitalized."

Starting this evening, a series of special lectures will be given by Dr. Poling on "Why I believe the Bible to be the Word of God." Each lecture will start promptly at 7:30 o'clock. Dr. Poling has aroused a great deal of interest in Salem for his forceful address and the depth of his philosophy.

On Friday evening, a special service will be held for the young people, who, Dr. Poling declared, feel the need of a more vital insight into religion than has ever before been witnessed.

Preceding services tonight, a short prayer meeting will be held, starting at 7 o'clock. During the main services the male quartet of the men's Bible class will be heard.

## Annual Statements Must Be Published in Newspapers

Will Moore, state insurance commissioner, who has waged an active campaign for the publication of annual statements in newspapers of general circulation, has been advised by the attorney general that such is demanded by law. Letters are being sent to all those interested. The opinion from the attorney general read:

"That such newspaper shall have been established and regularly and uninterruptedly published in such county at least once a week during a period of at least 12 consecutive months immediately preceding the first publication of such notice."

This ruling eliminates the publishing of such statements in any publication other than a regularly issued newspaper. Mr. Moore, in taking his stand, held that the public was entitled to know about the business rather than the business itself.

## GENERAL UPSET OF WHEAT WITNESSED

Dearth of Buying Causes Sudden Fright; Values Are Demoralized

CHICAGO, March 16.—Sudden fright over the dearth of buying swept through the entire grain market today at the last and resulted in big selling and a general upset of values. Wheat fell 8 1/2 c a bushel from the day's top figures and closed excited, \$1.64 1/2 to \$1.65 for May delivery and \$1.45 1/2 for July, the bottom prices reached 4 1/2 c to 6 c under Saturday's close. Rye finished at 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 c net loss, corn 3 1/2 to 4 c down, oats 1 5/8 to 2 1/8 c off and provisions varying from 7 c decline to 2 c advance.

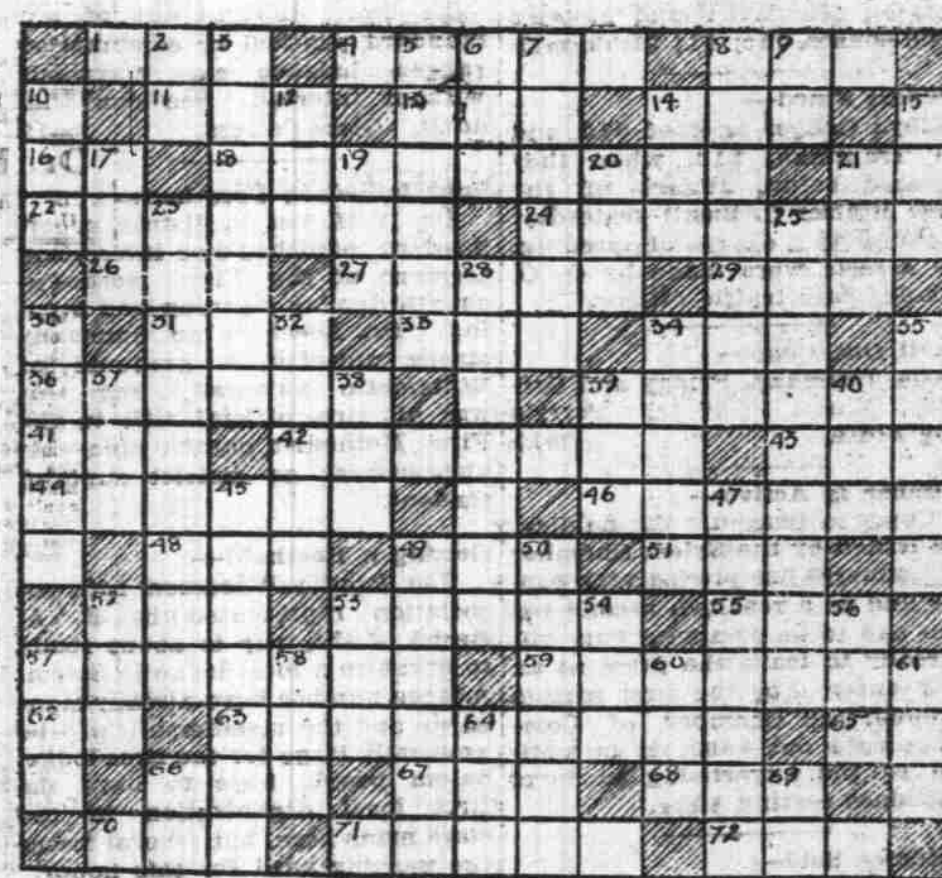
It was hardly more than half an hour before the end of the day that the situation across which demoralized the wheat market.
