OUR HEAD LETTUCE INDUSTRY Through the ambitious experimenting, venturesome spirit and untiring industry of the group of farmers, mostly Americanized Japanese, on the Labish Meadows lands north of Salem, this city is on the way towards becoming a head lettuce center.

The center of a gigantic industry drawing big sums of money annually from long distances. And the prospective big industry will not necessarily be located exclusively on the beaver-dam lands of the Labish district.

Roy K. Fukuda, the pioneer and leading spirit of that group of vegetable growers, who started the now wonderfully successful celery industry there, commenced experimenting with head lettuce several years ago.

But they are not through experimenting. They want the best, the same as they have attained with their celery; the best that can be produced in this country, or any country.

The Labish farmers, Japanese and American, are by no means through experimenting with new vegetables with a view to producing them on a commercial scale, in car lot shipments.

ON THEIR WAY

In the past 30 days 162 families in various parts of the country have notified W. G. Ide, manager of the land settlement department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, that they intend to come to Oregon to locate on the land and that they will bring with them to invest \$324,200.

During the past three months similar announcements indicate the determination of more than 250 to come to Oregon and invest here \$1,074,200.

Since the economic value of a family is rated at \$5000, the worth to the state of this influx is about \$1,400,000, or a total of nearly \$2,500,000, as the index of their initial value to the state.

Many of Oregon's local communities are keeping prospective citizens in touch with their opportunities. It is part of the great Westward movement. It is part of the striving in narrow streets and on treeless plains to realize the promise of the promised land.

The above from the Portland Journal indicates a movement towards the land that will likely wake up the real estate transactions in farms in Oregon very soon.
