A. Churchill, superintendent of public instruction. The pamphlet contains the stories of the boys and girls who were first prize winners at the state and international fairs and these stories are full of human interest in their description of the strivings of Oregon boys and girls to complete their projects. In the foreword Superintendent Churchill says:

"We believe this club work to be one of the most important movements in modern education. It is a potent method of character development.

"To begin a worthy project and carry it through to completion is, in itself, an example of persistence and determination worthy of emulation by older citizens. It teaches the dignity of labor and the economic value of the best method of accomplishment. It encourages thrift and self-reliance. It develops good judgment and an appreciation of excellence whether of one's own work or that of others. Its competitive feature instills a spirit of fair play and good sportsmanship.

"We recommend this work to the school children of Oregon, and should like to see every boy and girl in the state having an aptitude for club work, especially in the rural schools, engaged in some project of club work."
