

# ILLIHEE SPRING GOLF TOURNEY WILL GET UNDER WAY TODAY

## TRI-CITY CLUB MATCH SLATED

Tentative Dates Are Set for Playing Between Salem, Corvallis and Eugene

Fred A. Williams, chairman of the tournament committee, announces considerable activity for

the coming months at the Illihee Country club.

The first play will be for the Al Krause cup. Qualifying rounds will be played off today and Sunday, and those holding the 16 lowest scores will begin the play-off in the match on April 4.

Tentative dates of the inter-city club match between Corvallis, Eugene and Salem will be May 19 at the Illihee club; May 17 at Eugene, and May 24 at Corvallis. Corvallis and Eugene each have a leg in on this cup and two legs wins the race and the trophy. The only possible way to prolong the race for this cup will be for Salem to win this year.

It seems that the backward spring has produced a lethargic condition among members of the club and it may be necessary to inject several pounds of pep into the team before they wake up to the fact that the real open golf season is at hand.

Last Sunday there were probably 100 players at the course, attracted by the velvety greens and the warm sun, but practice has not been intense enough to perfect the game for tournament play.

Other contests to be held and will follow continuously will be the play for the Gray Belle trophy and the Dan J. Fry trophy.

The ladies are not going to be neglected this year and there are two tournaments in sight now, with handsome trophies by Mr. Schlosberg and A. A. Keene. It seems far more satisfactory to hold separate contests for the men and the women, and later hold a mixed foursome tournament.

Graham P. Sharkey, the professional, will give a silver golf ball for the low medal score in the qualifying rounds for the Al Krause trophy. This will be an 18-hole play.

an effort to forget that she had shot her mother. Though the girl admitted the shooting freely at the time, her attorney has intimated in examining prospective jurors this week that they will put at issue every contention of the district attorney. It has been hinted that her signed confession will be contested on the ground of fraud and duress and that there may even be evidence intended to show that the girl did not actually kill her mother but admitted the act to shield some one else. The defense, however, has continued to center its efforts on the alleged mental incompetence of the girl. Physicians, alienists and one psychiatrist have been subpoenaed to support this theory.

(Continued from page 1) counties are under the Oregon motor vehicle law credited to the motor license fund and are to be used for the payment of interest and retirement of bonds issued by the counties for road construction and improvement, or, in case no bonds have been issued or other provision made for the payment of interest or the retirement of road bond issues, then in preparing road-beds, bridges, etc., for the construction of state highways, and in the event provision has been made for the foregoing purposes then such funds may be used in the discretion of the county court in any other manner for general road improvement, however, within certain limitations. Under the law, distributions of the moneys received from motor vehicle licenses are made on March 15th and September 15th of each year.

ern Pacific, estimated the cost of the new lines as in excess of \$37,000,000 and declared that it was unlikely that any person now living would see the day when such lines could earn a return on that investment. The Southern Pacific was chiefly concerned, he said, because the Oregon proposal would require it to open sections of its main line track to common use by other railroads. Dey further questioned the power of the interstate commerce commission under existing statutes to require the railroads to invest money in new construction or to require the reopening up main lines to competing systems.

(Continued from page 1) stimulus to the growing of flax is given. It is stated that such a surge is needed by the industry here to give it a good start.

The matter of labor for the more intricate and technical part of producing the flax could be cared for by the importation of Canadian workers, who are thoroughly experienced. With the starting of the mill in this city, it would only be one of the things that are to be established in the country.

In a more detailed statement of the cost of establishing a mill in this city, Mr. Sanson said that about \$92,000 would have to be spent on buildings and grounds and about \$107,000 on a sprinkler system. The building would be 190 by 300 feet in size, one story in height and have a saw tooth roof.

Equipment of the mill must necessarily be of British manufacture, as the American manufacturers are not equipped to make the proper machinery.

Oregon people will be left to run the new mill, was the declaration of the speaker, but the advice and guidance of the more experienced technical men of the eastern mill could be used if necessary.

## KILL STRANGER OFFERED RIDE

(Continued from page 1) one of the men was interviewed Friday morning and the other late in the afternoon. The first man wrote out a full confession, which was signed by him and later by the other man.

"I wish to make a complete confession to you of my part in murder committed near Chehalis, Wash., the latter part of May, 1924," the confession read. "I have given you a newspaper clipping, containing an account of the finding of the body and I think my mind will be relieved by a full and open confession. I ask you to notify the authorities at Chehalis so that the mystery may be cleared up. God knows that I am very sorry for what happened."

According to the story told to Warden Dairymple by the convicts, they had stolen an automobile in Seattle and had started to drive toward Chehalis when they were halted by a man walking along the highway in the outskirts of Seattle. He was in a drunken condition, the men said, and boasted of having several hundred dollars in his possession and wore a diamond stick pin.

Scuffles for Diamond One of the men drove the machine while the other rode in the back seat with the stranger. Af-

ter driving several miles an effort was made to rob the passenger of his stick pin. In an ensuing scuffle, the stranger who was picked up got the best of the argument and the would-be robber called upon his partner for assistance.

The driver carried a revolver. He turned around and fired, killing the unfortunate passenger. Both the young men claim they became bewildered after the deed was committed and scarcely knew what to do. They carried the body in the car through Chehalis and drove several miles from the city, taking \$250 in cash and the diamond stick pin from the dead man. The clothing was destroyed and the body buried in a shallow grave and covered with brush.

From Jackson County The two self-confessed murderers were received at the penitentiary from Jackson county about four months ago to serve a five year sentence for burglary. One of them admitted having served 18 months for a minor offense in another state prison. The other, as far as is known, has no previous record.

It was stated last night that

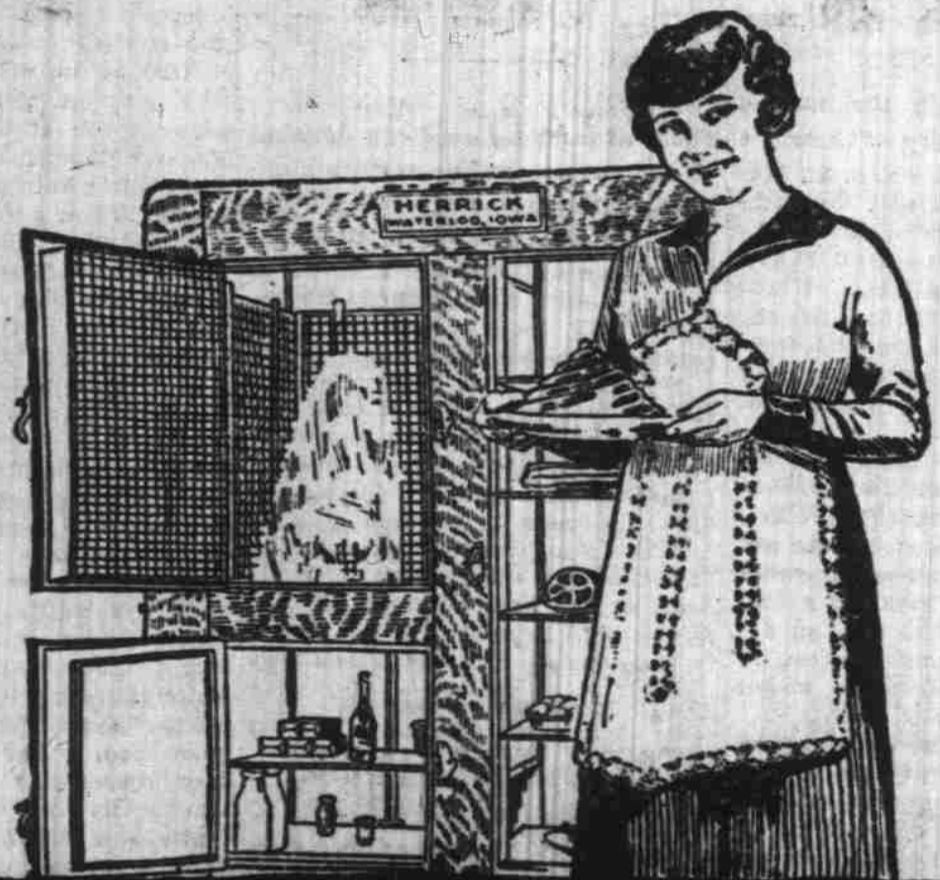
