The state land department paid to the state treasurer during the month of March a total of \$120,128.34, according to the report of George G. Brown. Payments on loans and income sources of the common school fund principal amounted to \$79,919.82; payment on loans, OAC fund principal, \$6,515; interest, \$1820.23; payment on loans, university fund principal, \$400; fund interest, \$485.24; rural loan credits fund, \$578.52; interest, \$1278.48; A. R. Burbank trust fund interest, \$45.25, and Apperson fund principal, \$200.

Is Good Student

Ferlan B. McCroskey of Salem, a freshman taking a pre-law course at the University of Oregon, was among those students to receive nothing less than II in academic subjects for the winter term ending March 20, according

to the grade sheet issued by the registrar's office.

Forty-nine women and 41 men students out of a total enrollment of approximately 3,000 received no grades less than II for the past term's work. Only three women and one man received I in all subjects. I is the highest grade given unless special honors are applied for at the beginning of the term. Passing grades range from I to V.
