DALLAS PIONEER BURIED TUESDAY

N. L. Butler Called by Death Sunday; Crossed Plains Early in 1842

N. L. Butler, aged 83 years, a pioneer citizen and long prominent in the affairs of Polk county, crossed the great divide at his home in Dallas Sunday.

With a boyhood friend, Butler enrolled at Willamette university and numbers among his classmates Sam L. and Syl C. Simpson.

Mr. Butler crossed the plains with his parents by ox team, having been born in Pittsfield, Illinois, August 28, 1842.

On September 17, 1871, he married Hester E. Ellis, who also came of a pioneer family.

Kiwanis Club Hears Dr. Walter H. Brown Speak at Tuesday Luncheon

Presenting the matter of community health on an economic basis, Dr. Walter H. Brown, director of the Marion county health demonstration, discussed "the most valuable crop" before the Kiwanians Tuesday.

"Last year 149,000 babies were born in Oregon and it is the quality of the boys and girls that will carry on the future of this state," declared the speaker.

"The business of health in the community can be reduced so that it will mean dollars and cents to the business men of the community.

"One of ten babies die each year and we can cut that death rate in half by the application of definite, hygienic laws.

"The average business man does not realize the physical handicap which the school children of the country are suffering.

"Nearly one third of the young men of the nation were rejected for military service during the recent world war," Dr. Brown said in closing.
