3000 GOAL SET FOR MEMBERSHIP

Associated Charities Will Launch Intensive Campaign for Needy

The Salem Associated Charities plan for a membership of 3,000 for the coming year, according to plans formulated yesterday noon at a special meeting of the organization at the YWCA.


The Associated Charities are hindered considerably each year and undue suffering is caused by the situation. The plan proposed by Rev. Martin Foreshethian, local attorney and pastor of the Unitarian church, suggests the membership method of securing the funds.

It is proposed to have 3,000 persons secure a membership into the organization at \$1 per person, which will give the association enough working capital and a reserve for the next year. This plan was adopted after discussion and is considered a solution for the problem of the relief unit here.

A committee composed of Rev. Mr. Foreshethian, chairman, Rev. Ward Willis Long, George Arbuckle, Rev. Mr. Chambers and Harry Levy was named to report details for putting on the membership campaign some time in September or October.

A benefit concert and dance is to be put on at the Armory Saturday, April 18, to raise funds to carry the Associated Charities through the present year. At the present time there is a sum of \$70 accredited to them, and it is necessary to secure funds to meet the April and May bills that are to be presented.

Road Plans Made FOR THIS SEASON

Construction to Start in Near Future; System Is Given Inspection

The road program for Marion county is getting under way, according to the announcement of County Roadmaster Culver, after making a trip with J. H. Scott, market road engineer for the highway commission.

The new law enacted by the legislature requires that the highway commission pass upon the market road program of the various counties, providing financial assistance, is desired from the market road fund of the state.

Marion county is working out a careful program on market road building and it is not expected that trouble will result when the project is submitted for approval.

It is expected that three miles of pavement will be added to the road between Stayton and Meham; also the road between Silverton and Silver Creek falls will be completed in order that travel may be made to the falls the year round. It is also proposed to construct a cut-off from Turner to the Pacific highway, but just where the cutoff will be located has not been determined.

From all indications the county will favor gravel roads because an increased mileage can be secured under the new process of construction. Between 15 and 17 miles of road will be cared for this year.

A tentative five-year program will be outlined this year in order that all work done this year will dovetail into a general scheme. The original five-year road program under the \$850,000 bond issue closed last year.
