World Aviators May Visit The United States in 1927
 WASHINGTON, April 4—A monster air exposition, attended by prominent world aviators, will be held in the United States in 1927, if the present program of the National Aeronautic association materializes. This association is the American representative of the international organization, which holds its convention this year at Prague, September 19-23. Next year the aviators probably will meet at Bucharest, and a move is already afoot to have the 1927 convention held in Washington.

Twenty-six countries are affiliated with the international federation, including many of the South American republics. About one hundred leaders in aviation usually attend its conventions. Previous gatherings of the federation have been held at Paris, London, Madrid, Rome, Munich, Zurich, Vienna and Stockholm.

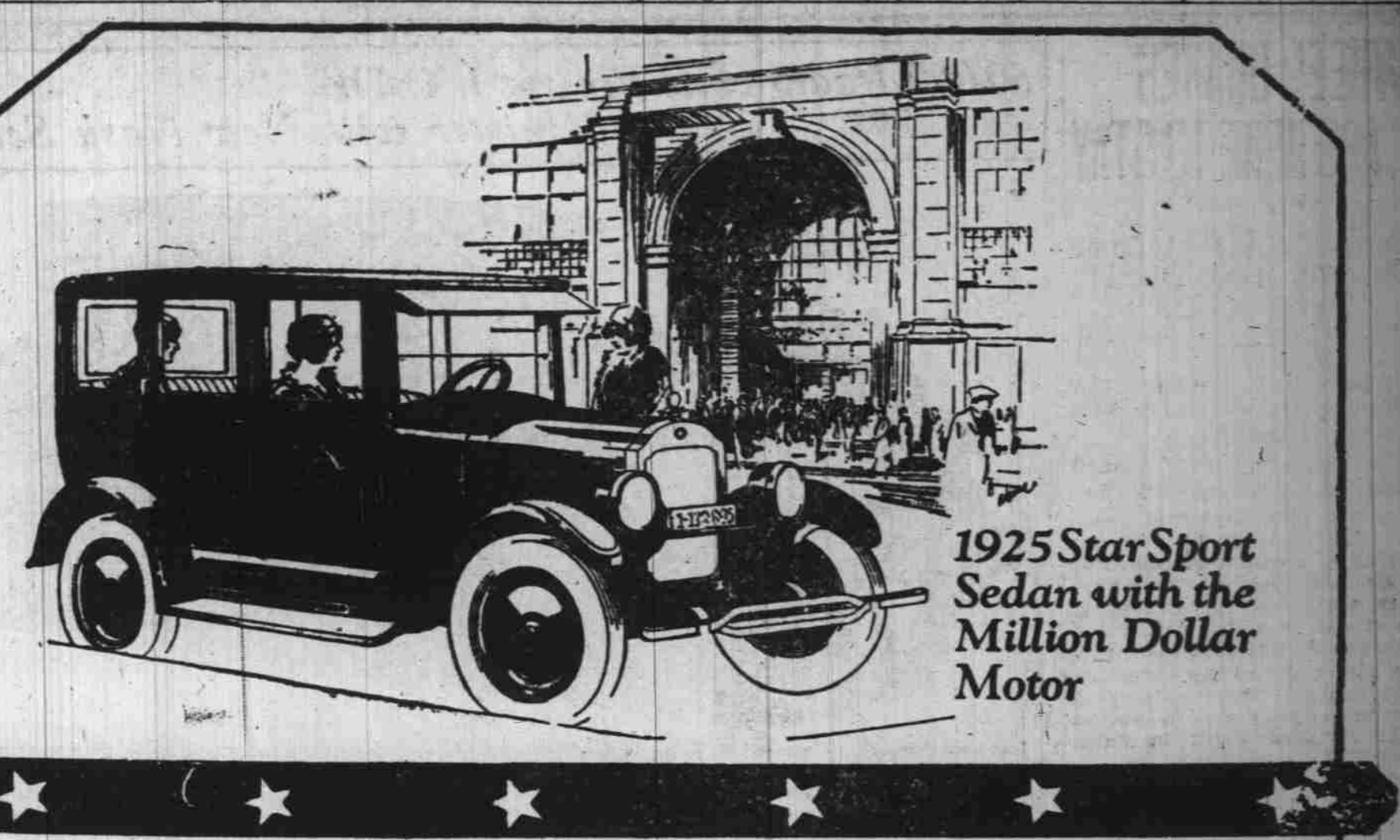
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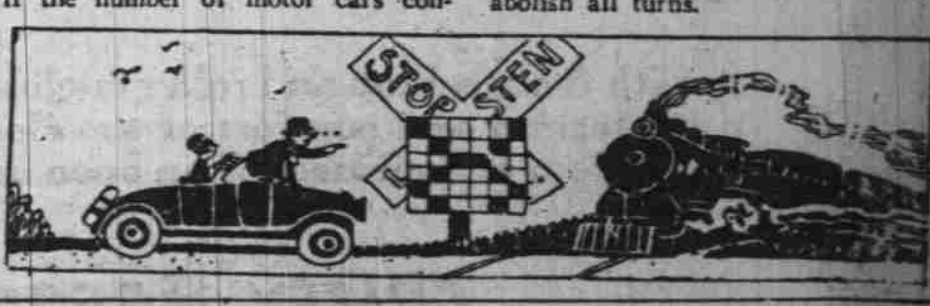

MILLION START FOR SUBWAYS IN ONE MINUTE

DURING the period of time between 5 and 5:01 every afternoon in New York, with the exception of Saturday and Sunday, 1,000,000 people start for the subways below 14th street.

There is a traffic problem to stagger anyone. Some communities have constructed rough approaches to railroad crossings to compel the slowing down of motor vehicles. Such approaches have frequently resulted in the breaking of axles with consequent legal suits. And such suits are costly.

The whole question of railroad crossings is a troublesome one. Of course, the ideal plan is to have all crossings underground or overhead. But this is most expensive. There are those who insist that motor cars shall stop before crossing a railroad crossing, but statistics show that many accidents are due to stalling on railroad tracks.
