NEW YORK, April 16.—Babe Ruth will undergo an operation here tomorrow for relief from abscesses which have developed since his removal to the hospital upon the return of the New York Yankees from their southern training trip. Announcement to this effect was made by physicians who have been attending the home run king since his collapse on a train bound for New York and his removal on a stretcher from the Pennsylvania station to the hospital where he has been suffering from indigestion and influenza. Although tomorrow's operation is described by his doctors as of a minor nature, they said that recovery would be slow and that he might not be able to play for another month. He had hoped to return to the lineup this week-end.
