Foreign Students Find Christianity Lacking whole Christian movement."

NEW YORK, April 18-Amerca has the largest enrollment of foreign students in the world and any of these youths, composing the greatest student migration in history, are struggling against heavy odds of inhospitality and race prejudice while carrying on heir studies, according to the findings of a committee of investigators. An expansion of the Friendly Relations committees of the Young Men's Christian and the Young Women's Christian asociations, the investigation group s composed of 24 representatives of many welfare and denominaonal bodies. It is called the mmissionon Survey of Foreign students in the United States and its labors in this field have taken three years.

The need for self-support has en no small factor in the lives these young students from disant lands, the commission found, and many have taken back a sense of disillusionment as to America's eals and practices. Some find hat athe Christianity acquired from American missionaries was not confirmed by the Christianity met in the land which sent

the Teport sets forth. Fifteen hundred are women. The condition of these young people, the problems involved, and suggestions as to their treatment are set forth in the report.

"American life and the Christian church never have met a more severe and searching test," says Dr. Robert E. Speer, secretary of the board of foreign mission of the Presbyterian church, "than in the presence of these foreign students. They will not carry back what they do not get, and they will not get what we cannot or do not give."

Dr. Speer points out that not all these students have been disappointed and that thousands have gone home with strength and faith. In general the results of study abroad are more beneficial



Acting under authority of statute enacted in the closing days of the 68th Congress, the department is preparing to utilize the authority therein conferred to use vessels and vehicles seized in the process of enforcing the Volstead act.


