## COMMUNITY HOUSE WORK UNDER WAY

Construction on Building for City Auto Camp Already Started

The proposed community house of the Salem auto camp ground is to be an actuality. Preparations are underway and the new building will be finished shortly.

The house, to be located at the east end of the grounds near the entrance, will be 24 by 36 feet, facing west, and will have a porch running across the entire front of the building. Wood will be used to finish the structure, which will be lighted by many windows.

The building is planned to seat 150 people and it is planned to hold community gatherings, which will be addressed by speakers furnished by the Salem Chamber of Commerce, and programs from other sources.

The estimated cost is given as \$1200 and C. W. Thompson, local contractor, expects to finish the work within three weeks.

The building is to be an added attraction to the camp grounds.

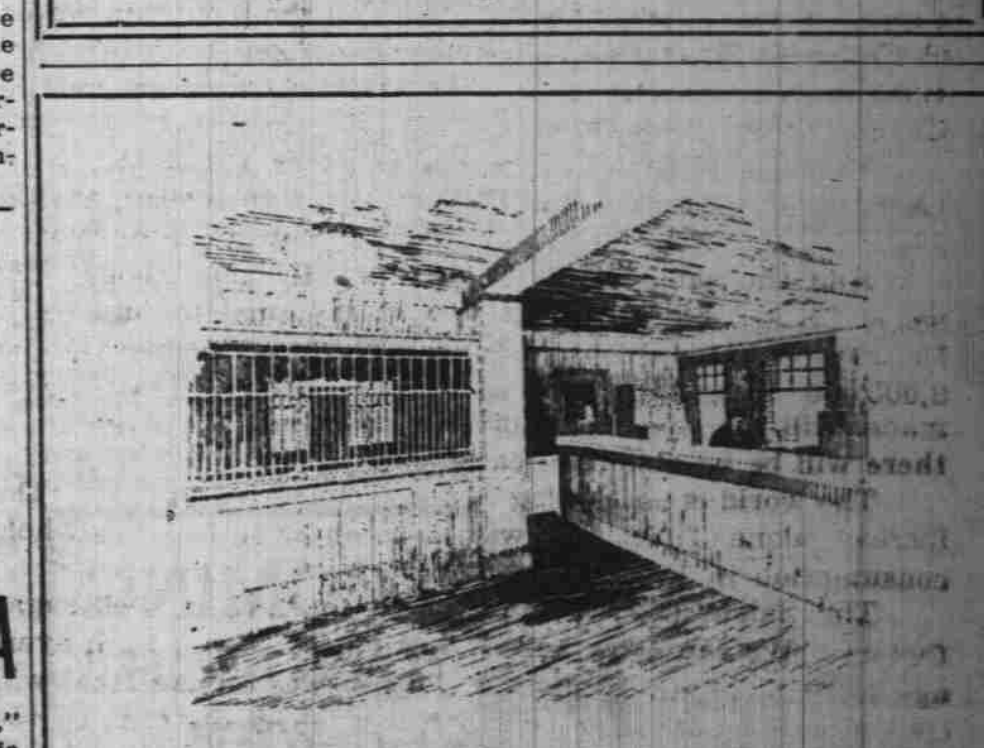

**Huge Buildings Erected on One-Time Quiet Street**  
DETROIT, April 21.—A decade or so ago a quiet residential street, today a thriving artery, is the transition of Washington street boulevard, a short thoroughfare starting at Michigan avenue in this city and terminating four blocks distant at Park boulevard.  
Another unit in the transitory progress is to come with the erection of a 35-story annex to the present Book building. At the intersection of Washington boulevard and Grand River avenue, the new structure will be the tallest building in Michigan, and is but another unit in the plan to make the boulevard Detroit's "Fifth Avenue."  
Among other projects announced is the new town house of the Aviation Town and Country club, also a sky-scraper, to be erected on the present site of the YWCA, at the corner of Clifford street and Washington boulevard.
