

NARCOTICS TALK GIVEN IN SALEM

Dr. Keith Allen, Authority and Crusader, Speaks to Packed House

Salem was privileged last week to hear Dr. Keith Allen, of Washington, D. C., an eminent authority and ardent crusader upon "dope," and whose eloquent address on "Narcotics, the Menace of the Nation," given to a packed house, was treated from every conceivable standpoint of the traffic, which, like a huge octopus, he states, is silently fastening its deadly grip upon and sapping the life-blood of the nation.

And Dr. Allen knows whereof he speaks, having been for three years head of the narcotics league of America, and whose duties as such, and since, have taken him the world over in investigation and research in this work.

"Remember, men and women—fathers and mothers," warned Dr. Allen, "that while the average American citizen unsuspectingly pursues his daily way, a gigantic, lawless, heartless 'dope' ring, which neither slumbers nor sleeps, and which is backed by untold wealth and power, is engaged in a definite, determined program to reach, and eventually enslave your child and mine, and every other boy and girl in America, with 'dope'—the result of whose efforts is not only alarming—it is appalling."

Dr. Allen augmented his statements by statistics which show the alarming increase, during the past few years, in the use of narcotics. In New York City alone, 17,000 school children are hopeless victims of the drug habit, and New York is but an illustration of other parts of the country. In support of his startling statements, Dr. Allen quoted medical, judicial and rescue and welfare authorities and statistics regarding the increasing drug habit, not only in social life but in the public and high schools of the country.

Dr. Allen made an eloquent appeal for more stringent laws regulating "dope," with severer penalties for the convicted. He pointed to the encouraging fact that gradually we are awakening to the fact that our institutions are in imminent peril from this insidious foe, "which," he dramatically declared, "I will fight to the last ounce of my life-blood."

Rumor to the effect that Frank Neer will not be the sole candidate in the field for election to the Salem school board were floated on the street Monday. Several business organizations, it is stated, have shown dissatisfaction to the arrangement at present, which allows a monopoly of the insurance business of the school property.

Mr. Neer is said to have not made any promises one way or another, when approached by the insurance men of the city who are seeking some of the school business. It is because of this dissatisfaction that the group of business men have promised to enter their candidate.

H. R. Crawford, whose name was mentioned when interviewed last night said, he was not willing to be a candidate to the school board and would not consider it under any circumstance.

County Veterinarians to Meet With County Court

Marion county veterinarians have been called by the county court to meet for a general discussion of the new herd law, as passed at the last legislature, which becomes effective May 28. Four candidates are in the field for appointment as herd inspectors. These are Dr. W. G. Morehouse of Salem; Dr. G. F. Korkink of Stayton; Dr. A. W. Simms of Silverton, and Dr. Thos. Simms of Woodburn.

The county officials plan to divide the county into four districts and have each veterinarian to have charge of the district in which he resides. The new law provides that a test shall be made of the herds at least once a year.

Young & Wells Will Buy Fresh Fruit on Cash Basis

Young & Wells are to buy fruit in Salem on cash basis, according to the announcements made by Ed Biehn, who has been placed in charge of the Spokane firm's activities here. Biehn will handle

the cherry buying proposition. L. W. Wells is to return here soon to secure a permanent location for the firm. The firm plans to handle black cherries, pears and apples. Crop conditions will determine whether other fruits will be handled.

The firm expects to secure a large block of the cherries here by using the cash basis, disregarding the fact that many of the growers have signed up for their crops. It is reported that 30 tons have been signed up by Deaney & Company.

Pears will be bought on the same basis as apples, according to the plans at present, and it is expected that the apple deal will be larger than last year.

Willamette University Lose In Dual Pacific Debate

The final result of the Willamette Freshmen's dual debate with Pacific University stood 5-1 in favor of Forest Grove university. The Willamette affirmative, William McAllister and Meredith Woodworth, were defeated here by a 3-0 decision. The Willamette negative, John Heltzel and Earl Pemberton, lost there by a 2-1 decision.

This defeat will even the score between the Willamette and Pacific freshmen as the Willamette representative defeated the Pacific team there by a 2-1 decision in that leg of a triangle debate between Willamette, OAC and Pacific, held last year.

that he did not feel justified in taking into consideration in this budget any substantial expansion of trade, which admission is regarded as rather pessimistic in view of the country's prospects. What the house, the country and in fact the whole world were listening for, however, was the government's decision with regard to gold payments. The government's determination to return to the

gold standard was known, but not when the momentous change would come.

The only question open, continued the chancellor, was the difficult and delicate question of how and when. Philip Snowden, chancellor of the exchequer in the late labor government, had appointed a committee to investigate amalgamation of the treasury and bank note issue.
