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PETITIONS MUST HAVE 9994 NAMES

Minimum Number Fixed by Kozier Upon Advise From Attorney-Generals

Petitions for the initiative or referendum of a measure shall contain a minimum of 9994 names of qualified voters, according to announcement made by the secretary of state here following receipt of a legal opinion from the attorney general.

The attorney general held that in computing the number of names required on initiative or referendum petitions the secretary of state shall divide by two the whole number of votes cast for the three candidates for justice of the state supreme court at the last general election.


Five per cent of the total votes cast for these candidates, after dividing the same by two, may be considered a sufficient number of signatures on the petitions, the attorney general held.

Three laws enacted at the last session of the legislature are under referendum attack. These include the so-called automobile bus and truck law, titling act, and the law providing for a tax on cigarettes, snuff and tobaccos.
