ENTRANCE MARKS ARE CLASSIFIED

Many Freshmen Unable to Meet Requirements of English Departments

In an effort to standardize the entrance requirements of the English departments of Oregon and better qualify the high school students to meet these entrance requirements the council of English teachers of the Inland Empire Education association and the higher educational standards committee of the OSTC, of which Dean George H. Alden of Willamette university is chairman, have compiled reports relative to the

number of freshmen who are unable to meet these requirements from the different colleges of Oregon.

The results show that out of the 64 high schools which sent 5 or more students to these colleges the average number of errors per student is 24.46 and that a total of 24,592 errors were made.

Wallawa high had the smallest number of errors on the list while Salem high was rated as 13th. There was a very small difference between the average number of errors made by the two schools, however.
