

Former Chiefs of Navy and Army Hold Debate on **Problems**

WASHINGTON, May 4-Arguments for and against military preparedness as the principal reliance for peace were presented in a radio debate tonight by former chiefs of the navy and army general staffs. Admiral William L. Rodgers represented the proponents of peace by armed might and Major General Tasker H. Bliss those endorsing "peace by cooperation."

Both have been retired after service careers of unusual length and scope. Reviewing what he termed the basic differences between the na-

tional viewpoint in the United States and that in her potential enemies, Rear Admiral Rodgers insisted that the "present heedless attitude toward preparation, and particularly navy, invites foreign contempt and at any moment may bring disaster." General Bliss contended that
