FALLS CITY NEWS OF PAST WEEK SHOWS ACTIVITIES OF LIVE TOWN

Work Progresses in Making Falls City the Spotless Town Road Open From Falls City to Vaisetz—American Forest Week Appreciatively Observed at Falls City—Nature Was Lavish in Making Falls City's Surroundings Beautiful—First Cultivated Ripe Strawberry

City Council Meets Monday Night—Street Work to be Continued, Main Street Will be Scraped and Oiled From Muck's Corner to City Limits on the East.

Regular meeting of city council was held Monday evening, May 4th, with Mayor Roy McDonald in the chair. Present were Councilmen Oleslow, Griswold, Hopkins and Brown, Auditor and Police Judge Carrie E. Jones, City Marshal Zimmerman, Treasurer H. Mather Smith.

The treasurer's report shows the city to have a balance of over \$4100 in the general fund, with some money in all other, except the street fund.

The mayor was authorized to make necessary arrangements with Polk county regarding rock crusher and engine belonging to the city, whereby we may secure gravel for use on the streets.

The street commissioner was instructed to have the street leading to the Epworth League city park graded, gravelled and oiled, as speedily as possible.

The marshal was instructed to secure and post traffic signs each side of the school buildings, same to comply with state laws regulating traffic past schools.

The electric light board made a partial report on the cost of bringing the electric light plant up to date for twenty-four hour service.

The council authorized the clean-up committee to have the old building furthest south on the main park property torn down Wednesday afternoon when the work is to be done in the park.

City auditor was authorized to take necessary legal steps to comply with law passed at the last session of the legislature regulating tourists camps and to pay the license fee.

The mayor expressed appreciation of the interest being shown by citizens of the town in visiting the council meetings and making their wishes known, asking that all interested in the building up of the community be present at the regular monthly meetings.
