## Ty Cobb Smashes Records



ST. LOUIS, May 6.—Tying the major league record, the veteran, Ty Cobb, playing manager of the Detroit Tigers, polled out three home runs in today's game with the St. Louis Browns. They were off Pitchers Bush, Vangilder and Gaston.

Cobb, who led the American league in batting for nine consecutive years is playing his 21st season in big league baseball. He has a record of holding American batting honors from 1907 to 1916 when Tris Speaker took the lead.

In today's contest Cobb hit six times in six times at bat, accounting for eight of his team's 14 runs. Besides three homers, he drove out a double and two singles.

The only other major league players who have made three home

runs in a single game in the 20th century are George Kelly of the Giants, Ken Williams of the Browns, Cy Williams and Henline of the Phillies.

Cobb, in smashing out six hits, collected a total of 16 bases, a new world's record for modern major league baseball. The previous record for modern baseball was held by Eddie Gharrity, Washington catcher, who ran his total of bases for one game to 13 in June, 1919.

The old record, made before advent of the American league was held jointly by Bobby Lowe of the Boston Nationals, who in 1894 collected four homers and a single, Ed Delehanty of Philadelphia Nationals, duplicated the stunt in 1896. Each of these players had a total of 17 bases.

## Film Agents in the Balkans Victims of Sharp Practice

BERLIN, May 6.—Picture pirates keep American moving picture agents on the jump in the Balkans. There are no copyright laws and treaty provisions which protect American films in Turkey, Rumania and Bulgaria, and consequently these countries are the happy hunting ground for film thieves. A film stolen in transit is copied and the copies sold in the Balkan countries.

As a result of this illicit trade, American producers are now rushing their new films immediately into the markets where there is no protection, and selling them before pirates have a chance to get hold of them.

It is not uncommon, according to film agents in Berlin, to discover American films of the most expensive sort showing under another title in the cinemas of Turkey, Bulgaria and Rumania, where the moving picture men snap their fingers at agents who demand rent, and dare them to try to collect in the courts.

## WONDERFUL RECORD BROKEN BY PLAYER

NEW YORK, May 6.—(By Associated Press.)—Everett Scott today gave way before lame knees after playing in 1,307 consecutive games of major baseball.

On June 20, 1916, as a member of the Boston Red Sox, Scott started on a record that no other athlete has approached on a baseball diamond. Day after day, year after year, he was seen in his accustomed position. The end, so long forecast, came today at the Yankee stadium. Scott, now captain of the former world's champion New York Yankees, donned his uniform but remained in the dugout while little Paul Wanning, a recruit, took his place in the game against Philadelphia.

## Livestock in Great Britain Shows Marked Decrease

MARGATE, May 5.—Britons will have to rely on foreign imports of meat to a greater extent than ever because of the serious decline of cattle raising in Great Britain. At the annual meeting of the National Federation of Meat Traders' associations it was stated that since 1916 stock had declined in England from 18,000,000 to 14,800,000 head last year. The decrease in Scotland was about 200,000 head and in Ireland the numbers had fallen from 3,700,000 to 509,000.

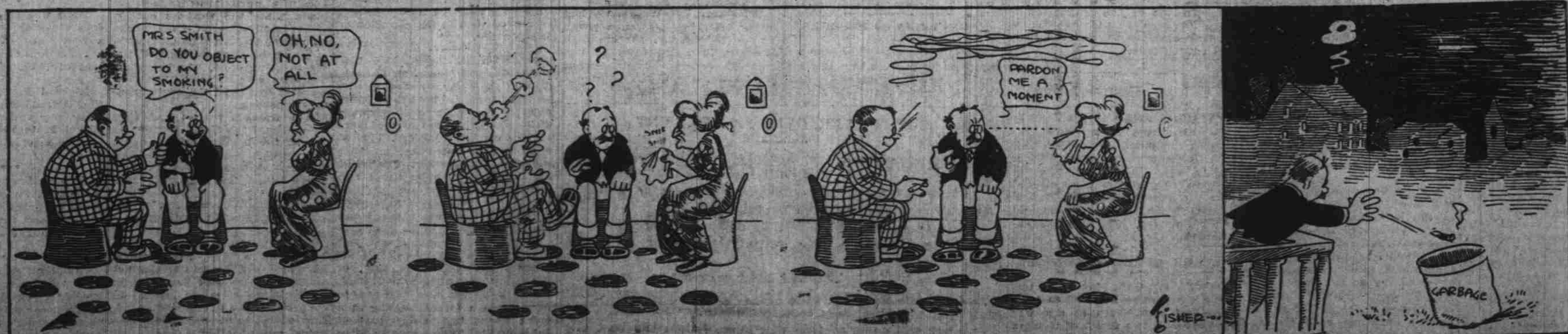
