

# STUDENTS REFUSE TO PROVIDE MONEY FOR PAYMENT OF COACH'S SALARY

## SUCCESSFUL YEAR HAS NO BEARING

Poverty Plea Is Offered; Purchase of Supplies Is Also Criticized

Despite one of the most successful years in athletics that the Salem high school ever had, the student council of the associated student body failed to vote in favor of appropriating funds to pay part of the salary for Coach Huntington for the coming year, it was disclosed at the meeting of the school board last night.

Lack of funds was the reason given for their action, coupled with the plan that the students had voted \$500 to help create an athletic field for the high school.

As the matter now stands, the school board pays part of the coach's salary, while the balance is made up by the associated student body. With the failure of the student council to vote favorably, the issue of whether the local high school is to have a coach was brought to the fore.

There was some rumor about the school that some one was agitating for Coach Huntington's job, despite the satisfactory service that he has given during the past year.

Under the regime of having an executive of the high school supervise the purchase of supplies for the high school athletics considerable hard feeling has been developed. It is thought that this might be one reason for the opposition from the school. However, there was nothing to verify this rumor except the grumblings of the athletes in reference to some of the goods that have been purchased and used. On previous occasions the students have been left in a hole by the manner of purchasing athletic goods. Under the present ruling all purchases are made with a requisition, and a strict accounting made of the supplies. It is stated that the most satisfactory arrangements have been made in the way of saving money for the associated student body.

Opinion seems to be divided among students concerning the appropriation of money to retain Coach Hollis Huntington. It is thought, however, if the matter of having or not having a coach for the coming year, the difficulty might be straightened out. George W. Hug, city superintendent of schools, was appointed to investigate the condition and to make a full report at the next meeting of the school board.

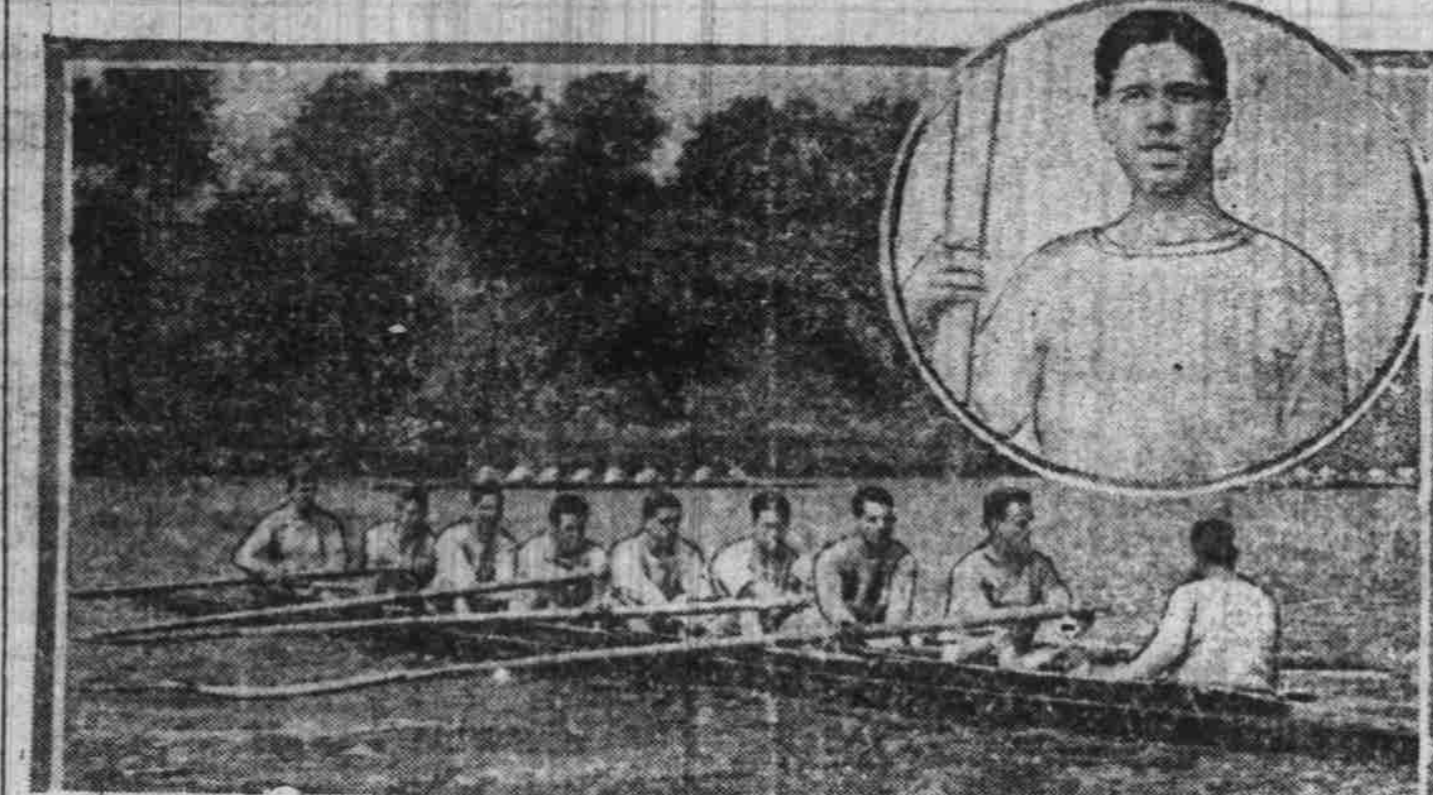
Chicago 5; New York 4

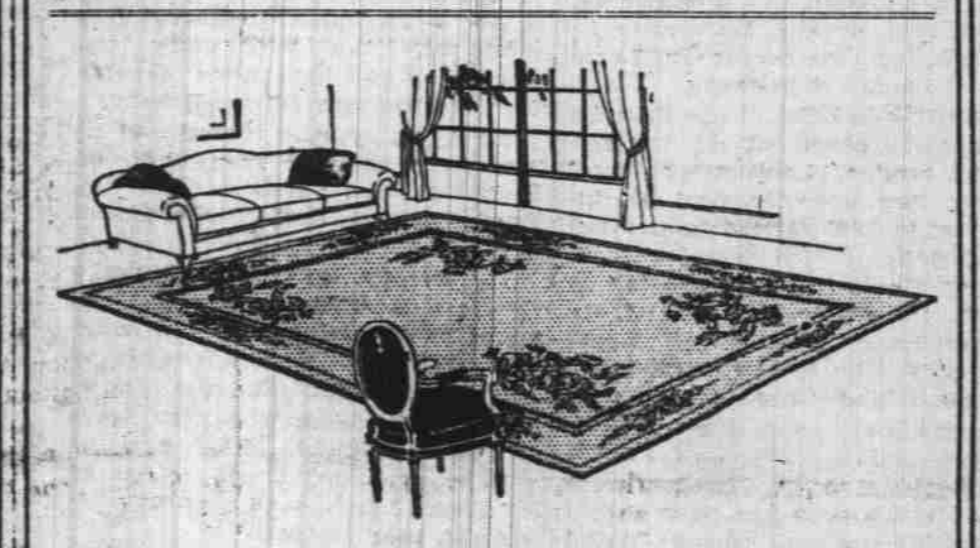
## PLAY CONTINUES
