WILL SHIP FRUIT

Denney & Company, Black Cherry Buyers, Will Return Here

Denney & Company will be in Oregon again this year for some of the blackberry shipments, according to announcements made by Roy Hurst, representative of the company. Packing and shipping will be done from the old Salem Fruit Union building.

Plants are to be established in different parts of the Willamette valley, Portland, Eugene, Sheridan and McMinnville. It is expected that the tonnage will be somewhat less than 150 tons this year, according to Hurst.

Shipments will start from here between June 25 and July 1, with the tonnage that is signed up by the company. However, they will buy wherever the opportunity is presented. Prices are not stated.

Mr. Hurst has issued another warning, urging growers to spray their cherries and any grower failing to do so will be out as far as the company is concerned. Spraying should be done between the 1st and 10th of June.
