This, in a nutshell, was the finding the other day of the AAU, after investigating charges made against Paavo Nurmi, wonder runner, his manager, Hugo Quist, and Wille Ritola, Finish-American star, and declaring them guiltless.

You recall that a short time ago the aforementioned Wilson, athletic director of Drake university, broke into print as the champion of amateur sports in particular, and clean sportsmanship in general. He cast a cloud of suspicion against Nurmi, against his greatness as a man as well as an athlete, and by accusing Nurmi and his associates of attempting to "hold up" Wilson for exorbitant

expenses for appearing in the Drake games. The amateur sport is so frequently tainted with this kind of stuff that a portion of the reading public immediately raised its eyebrows and said "Aha-a-a." Those who had seen Nurmi and had been following his every move withheld judgment, however, and with cause. I felt sure that Nurmi was innocent. Aside from the straightforward manner of Nurmi there was the logic of the thing. It didn't seem reasonable that Nurmi could be "pulling" such stuff for many weeks before being found out.

Now it turns out that it was Wilson and not Nurmi who had stepped from the path of rectitude. It was Wilson, shouter of amateurism and clean sports, justice to the public and whatnot, who took the first, if not the only step in the matter.

And as a result of the affair Wilson may be debarred from conducting affairs which are to have the sanction of the AAU.

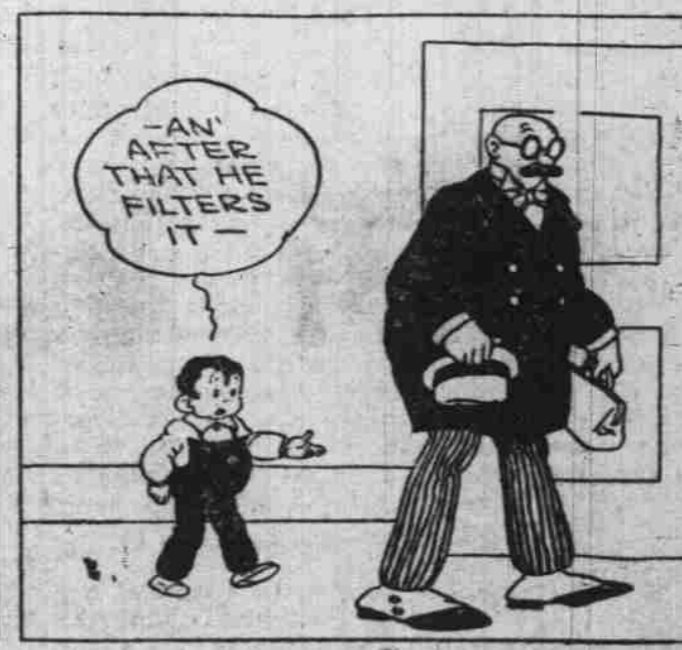
BEARCATS TO MEET C.P.S.

Special commendation of the Eugene course was made by local players who stated that the ideally located course is just four minutes from the heart of the city. Fairways are seeded and will be

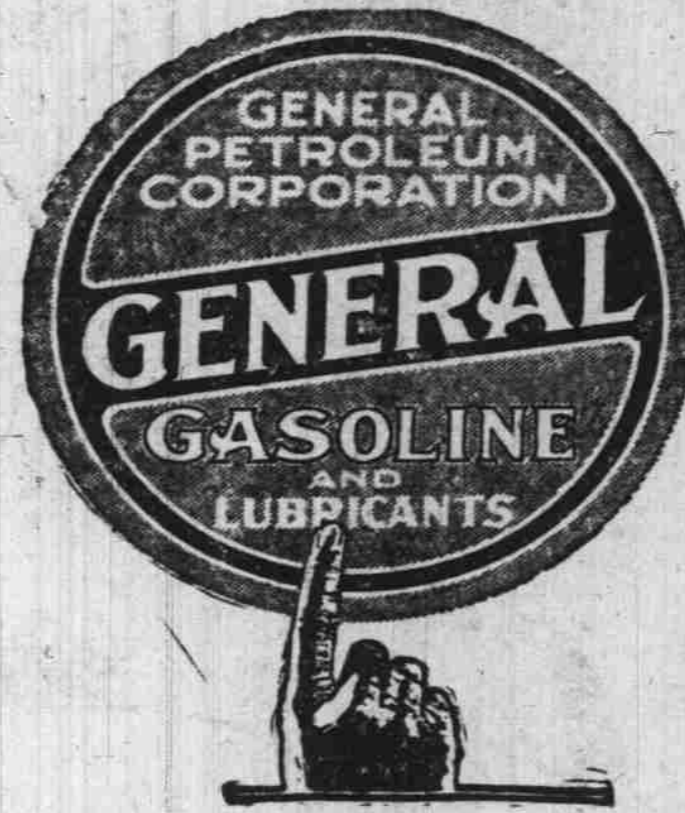
ready for next fall, it is declared, which will put into use nine additional holes.
