OCCUPY COUNCIL TIME

MANY ROUTINE MATTERS ARE TAKEN UP LAST NIGHT

Purchase of Excavator and Loader Being Considered and Investigated

ORDINANCES FOR READING WERE PRESENTED TO THE CITY COUNCIL LAST NIGHT WHICH WILL ESTABLISH THE SIDEWALK LINES ON THE EAST SIDE OF NORTH SUMMER, ON NORTH FRONT BETWEEN MARKET AND SOUTH; AND THE DEDICATING OF A FOUR-FOOT STRIP FOR WIDENING OF MYRTLE STREET, AND THE SEGREGATING OF ASSESSMENTS LEVIED AGAINST PROPERTY IN HIGHWAY ADDITION.

BIDS WERE ACCEPTED FOR THE PURCHASE OF AN EXCAVATOR AND LOADER WHICH IS TO BE USED FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF SALEM STREETS. THE MATTER WAS REFERRED TO THE STREET IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE WITH POWER TO ACT. TWO BIDS WERE ALSO ENTERED BY THE OREGON GRAVEL COMPANY AND THE SALEM BRICK & TILE COMPANY FOR SEWER TILING. THE MATTER WAS REFERRED TO THE PROPER COMMITTEE FOR ACTION.

THE CITY RECORDER WAS ADVISED TO ADVERTISE FOR BIDS TO ERCT AN ALLEY LIGHT BACK OF THE OLD YMCA BUILDING.

DECLARATION OF THE KIND OF IMPROVEMENTS AND THE APPROVAL OF PLANS WERE PASSED LAST NIGHT FOR THE NORTH SUMMER, BETWEEN MARKET AND MILL CREEK, FOR AN ALLEY IN BLOCK 88, TO EXTEND FROM MARION TO UNION, COMMERCIAL TO BROADWAY; BROOKS, HIGHLAND TO NORTH CITY LIMITS, AND NORTH WINTER FROM MARKET TO SOUTH.

OXFORD, England - For several years past Oxford men of adventurous character have been experimenting with new fashions evening clothes. They have ed coats without tails, and hats with white lapels, and down-breasted coats with knee patches, but always in vain. At last a new style has been accepted. Young Oxford men of rans and spirit now go out of an evening in silk stockings, light knee breeches, blue or purple vest jackets, and cream silk shirts much frilled at the throat and the cuffs. While the fashion is not greatly stable for subway or rainy evenings wear it is declared by its proponents to be certainly more sturdy and a vast deal more pleasing than the "full dress" which what they characterize as a duller of last centuries, has crept should encase mankind when he steps out for a bit of an evening.

M. P.'s TURN TO TEA

LONDON, May 15. - Tea drinking among members of the House of Commons is on the increase. During 1924 more than 100,000 teas were served to the parliamentarians, compared with 74,059 in 1923. Lunches and dinners also increased and a profit of \$625 was made on the teas and meals served in 12 months.

BELGRADE, Jugoslavia, May 14

Zair Effendi, who is believed to be Europe's oldest man, counting 151 years, recently stopped here one night on his way to Rome. He is said to have been born in Kurdistan in 1774, but has lived in Constantinople most of his life. Italian doctors invited Zair to Rome, where he is to be the guest of the Anthropologists' Society and will be examined by physicians who are interested in the causes of his longevity. He has only one child living, a son who is 30.

SILK LINED COATS

"Coats are lined with real silk," reads the clothing merchants' notices of superior men's wearing apparel. Much is made of that fact, - the inclusion of real quality materials to support the main fabric of the garment. A suit costs only from \$35 to \$75. Yet there are those who will spend from \$1,250 to \$5,000 for an automobile and take little notice of the "lining" - the upholstery, to learn whether it will look as well a year hence. Broadcloth and similar woven fabrics can be cleaned successfully only by taking them off the cushions. A vacuum cleaner and ordinary soap and water will clean thoroughly the rich mohair used in Studebaker cars, and the mohair costs twice to four times as much as the other. The silk-lined coat should be, also, a real mohair upholstery buyer.

TWO JERSEYS WINNERS

ONE COW IS OWNED BY BREEDER LIVING AT MARION

Oregon gets another record when two Jersey cows qualified as medal winners for milk and butterfat produces, according to the word received here by the American Jersey Cattle club. One of the prizewinners is Ida H. St. Mawes, No. 473605, a senior three-year-old Jersey cow bred and reared by F. E. Lynn, of Perrydale, Ore. She produced 11,385 pounds of milk and 671.07 pounds of butterfat in a 365 day test. Creme Vive Glow 519666 is the name of the Pickard Bros. of Marion, silver medal winner, who began at the age of two years and four months of age to produce. She is credited with 223 pounds of milk and 37.2 pounds of butterfat. She qualified for a silver medal in class AA.

INJURED TOTAL 242 DURING MONTH JUST PASSED

Nearly 2000 accidents were reported by county, state and Portland traffic officers for April, according to a statement prepared Monday by T. A. Rafferty, chief state traffic officer. There were four persons killed and 242 injured in the 1934 accidents. Carelessness caused the greatest number, 1303 being listed under this head. Forty-six were arrested for driving while intoxicated. Inspectors spent 339 days in the field, visited 1030 towns and cities and traveled 27,456 miles. Stolen cars recovered had a resale value of \$7725. Fines imposed upon motor vehicle law violators amounted to \$2,765.95, while \$3,642.25 in delinquent fines were collected.

WINNIPEG, Man., May 18. - Two men were killed and a third probably fatally injured Saturday night when two speeders collided on the Canadian Pacific railway near Regent, Man., it was learned today. Joe Waloiski, 21, and Alex Skonowski, 52, are dead, and John Kuzanok is in a hospital with head injuries. A coroner's jury today decided that the deaths were accidental.

IMPERSONATOR SENTENCED

YAKIMA, May 18. - On a plea of guilty, H. M. Hoyt was sentenced in federal court here today to serve six months in the Yakima county jail on a charge of impersonating a federal officer. Hoyt was said to have introduced himself to the postmaster at Walla Walla as a post office agent and to have cashed several small checks there.
