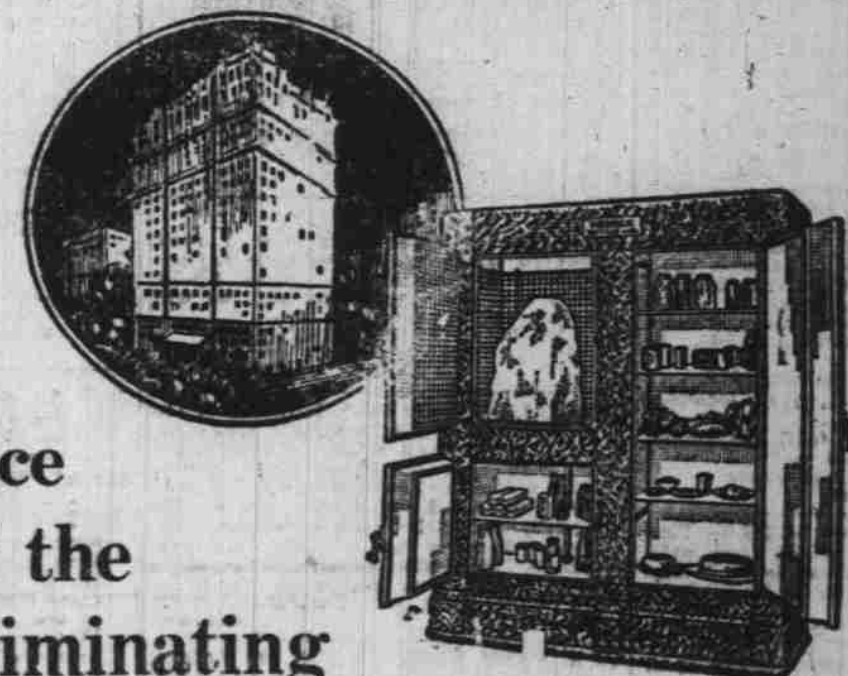
The election was held by the school executive committee after a number of candidates had tried out before the student body at the close of a regular student body meeting held last week.

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
