**Big Nastucka River—** Above Beaver via Rickreall and Amity—Fishing reported to be very good. Two limit catches were made Tuesday of this week with No. 5 double Hildebrandt copper spinner and chub bait. Fish also taking flies. Royal Coachman, Professor and English Admiral being the best flies.

**Three Rivers—** Coming into the Big Nastucka at Cloverdale. Some nice catches reported from this stream on spinner and chub. Royal Coachman, Professor and Queen of the Water flies. Salmon eggs also bring results. Take west side highway to Rickreall then thru

Amity to Cloverdale about three hours' drive from Salem.

**Little Luckiamute River—**

Some good fishing reported on this stream above Bridgeport. Spinner and chub and salmon eggs being the best bet. Take west side highway Bridgeport via Dallas.

Abiqua River and Butte Creek— Via Silverton. Some very favorable reports from those streams. Fish said to be taking flies and salmon eggs. The best flies being Black Gnat, Blue and Red Upright and Grye Hackle.
