Hard Working Farm Hands Find Time for Daily Dozen

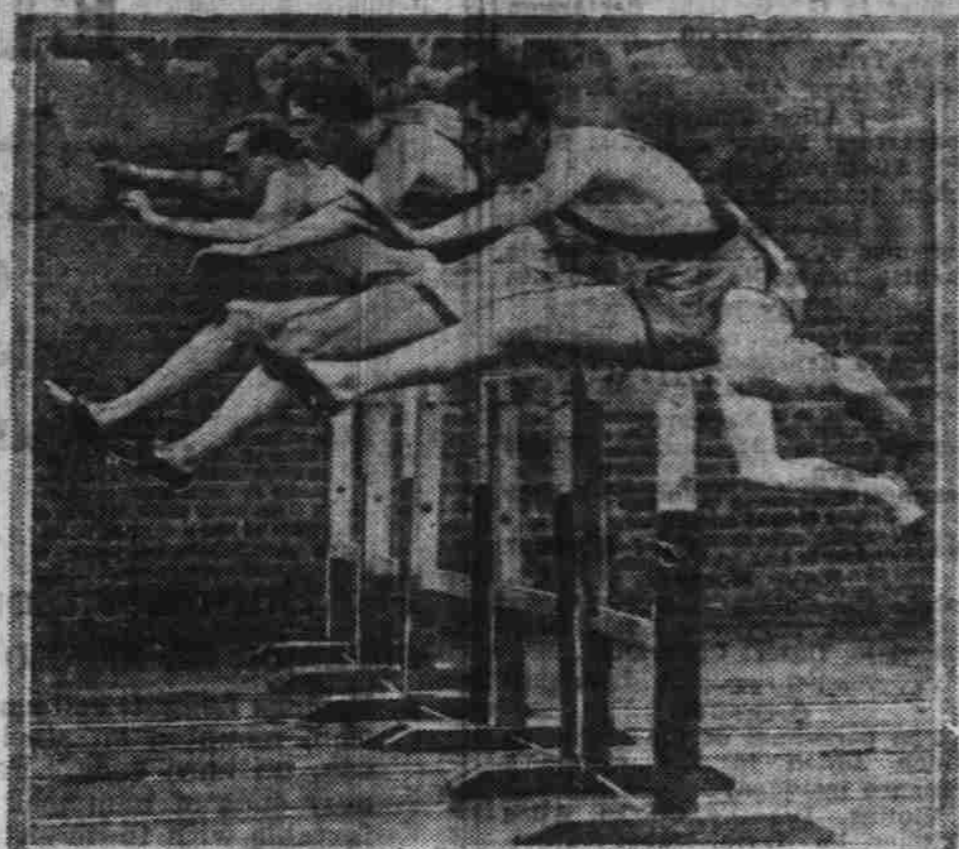
SAN FRANCISCO—The director of a radio broadcasting station here says many California farmers are going their daily dozen with the aid of the radio.

Promptly at 7 o'clock every morning a physical culture expert broadcasts directions for setting-up exercises, and there is a piano accompaniment. Whole families sometimes appear to attend in the privacy of their homes, the class in waistline reduction.

The only objection thus far received by the broadcast director came from some farmers, who asked for an earlier hour for their daily dozen. They wanted their exercises before milking the cows. But since the farmers are in the minority and the city radio fans consider 7 a. m. early enough, the hour is unlikely to be changed.

Sweden Out to Collect Fees from Radio Fans

STOCKHOLM, May 22.—Twelve per cent of Sweden's entire population are now licensed radio fans, and since the police have begun for the first time to round up illicit listeners the demand for official permits has grown by leaps and bounds. To meet the expense of operating the public broadcasting stations the department of telephones and telegraph, which has charge of the country's radio system, charges a license fee of \$3.25 for each receiving set. At the beginning of 1924 only 4,530 such permits had been issued, but today the figure is about 70,000.

By July 1 government officials plan to have completed the five principal broadcasting stations at Stockholm, Malmoe, Gothenburg, Sundsvall and Boden, all connected by wires for relay purposes, and so placed that every part of the country will be equally well served.
