**THE SECOND GARDEN** "at home" was successfully sponsored yesterday afternoon and evening at the Putnam, Lansing and Hamilton homes on Lincoln Hill, with the guest hours planned by one of Salem's most valuable civic organizations—the Salem Floral society. Such an opportunity—the viewing of gardens that have already undergone successful and beautifying landscaping—is a direct boon to all those interested in gardens of their own, as well as a source of delight for the appreciative.

The George Putnam garden, the first in the series, is approached by a terrace of red brick with borders of blossoming annuals at the edges. A notable feature in the garden is found in the three deep terraces of hewn stone progressing down the slope of the hill in front of the house.

Immediately to the north is the Lansing home which is beautiful for its masses of colored flowers, particularly the vivid sweet rocket intermingling with the rose garden. Rustic trellises at the back of the gardens add a pleasing touch.

Still farther to the north is the Hamilton garden which begins to round the hill. An effect that is unusually attractive in providing grassy expanses, broken in an interesting manner by masses of wild shrubbery, especially snowberry, has been carried out in detail.

All three of the homes are set in groves of oaks and evergreens forming an incomparable setting for the types of architecture that these houses represent.

**HEAD COLDS**  
Melt in spoon; inhale vapors; apply freely up nostrils.

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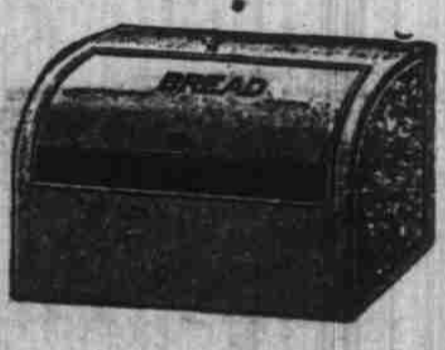

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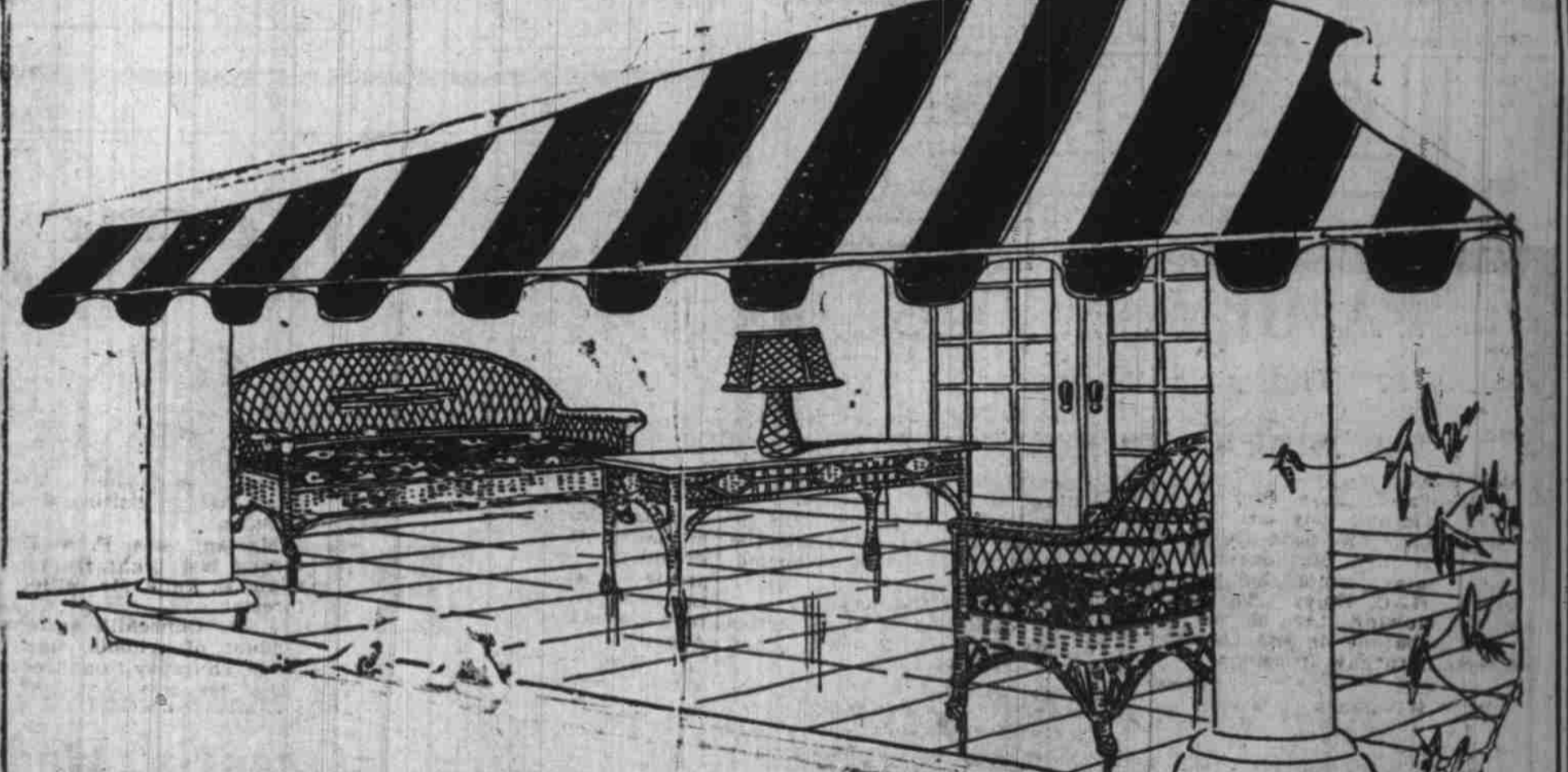
