The production of beet sugar from sugar beets is one of the most important subjects which can engage the at-tention of the people of this country today."

EVADING RESPONSIBILITY

Numerous are the methods for evasion of taxes. Recently man worth the startling sum of fifty million dollars passed It is reported that he left all of this vast accumulation of wealth here on earth invested in tax-exempt bonds. He had paid no income tax to the federal government for many years. He had invested no money in establishing industries in building nomes or in commercial enterprises and paid but a few dollars local taxes.

During these years when this man of money paid no taxes the expenses of the federal government had to be paid. State and local faxes were also collected. And they were met by taxpayers indirectly as in the case of the federal government or directly in case of smaller political units.

And unlike the bond investor these taxpayers have invested their money in commerce, in industry, in building homes and in other constructive effort which is most heavily burdened by

Among other phases of the situation which makes the action of the tax dodger more reprehensible is the fact that the taxpaying investor is the one who provides opportunity for the great mass of workers to earn a livelihood and to establish and maintain homes for their families. Without the investor in industry and commerce there would in fact be no progress.

One of the great needs of today is more money for investment. And one reason for this need is the billions of dollars invested and being invested in non-taxable securities. Further issuance of this type of securities should be permitted only in perishable letters. They will be looked upon as having accom-plished a historical undertaking, in the years of the future, and terest in this way, the states should include them under specific inheritances.

> No class or classes of individuals should be permitted to enjoy the privileges of government and force others to pay all or even an unjust proportion of the taxes.
