Every Strawberry Has Its Saturday Night With Machine Bath Equipment

Strawberry barreling operations has started in Salem with the first consignment to Baker, Kelley & McLoughlin at their quarters at the Northwest Food Products company plant at Commercial and Trade streets. The company has extensive barreling contracts here, with the first canning being done at Albany. Active work will commence here next week, it is said.

One feature which the company's plant here will have is the machinery for washing the strawberries before they are put away. Every berry is to get a bath this year.

From all indications this is to be the biggest berry season in the history of the firm. The rain that has fallen during the past week has tended to benefit the Etterbergs, the main grown berry of the district.
