FINAL DEGREES ARE BEING SOUGHT BY 428 SENIORS

Commencement Week at Eugene Opens Thursday, June 11, Closing June 14

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 23.—(Special)—Four hundred and twenty-eight seniors and graduate students have applied for degrees at the University of Oregon, and while failure to complete academic work may reduce this number somewhat before Commencement day, university officials say that the 1925 graduating class will exceed 400, a record in university history.

The event will also commemorate the completion of the highway connecting Woodburn with Newberg. Livestock exhibits are also contemplated for the show, along with fruits, flowers and vegetables. This show will be held prior to the annual Marion county corn show and industrial exposition at the Armory in Salem.

Two hundred and ninety-five seniors on the Eugene campus have applied for degrees. An additional 54 completed their work on March 14, and will participate in the commencement exercises, bringing the Eugene total of applicants to 349. According to present records, approximately 30 graduate students will receive either the advanced degree of master of arts or master of science. This number, together with 49 seniors who expect to take degrees in the school of medicine at Portland, bring the total applicants to 428.

Commencement week exercises begin Thursday, June 11, with the Felling and Beekman orations. The annual flower and fern procession is set for the following day. Alumni day is scheduled for Saturday, June 13, and baccalaureate Sunday for Sunday, June 14.

The commencement exercises, when graduates will receive their degrees, will be held in the Women's building, Monday, June 15. Dr. Joel H. Hildebrand, dean of men and professor of chemistry at the University of California, will be the commencement speaker.

Dr. Hildebrand is a leading scientist and educator and during the war he served brilliantly. He was awarded a Distinguished Service Medal for his work in the chemical warfare service.

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FINGER-PRINT EXPERT IS SPEAKER AT FORUM

J. S. MURRAY WILL ADDRESS BUSINESS MEN MONDAY

Work Carried on at State Penitentiary Will be Thoroughly Explained

J. S. Murray, chief clerk, Bertillon and finger print expert of the Oregon state penitentiary will address members of the Salem Chamber of Commerce at their regular meeting Monday noon. Mr. Murray is considered one of the authorities on finger print measurement on the Pacific coast and has been at the Oregon penitentiary for 15 years.

Mr. Murray will tell in detail how the finger print measurements of Oregon Jones were responsible for his return to Salem, following his arrest on a minor charge in California. Mr. Murray after comparing the records here telegraphed a few figures and symbols and the identity of Jones was fully established.

An introduction to finger prints will be made when specimens of finger prints will be displayed at the table of each diner.
