A packed house waited the opening of the senior class play, "Seventeen" by Booth Tarkington, Friday evening at the Eugene Field auditorium.

It would be difficult to single out anyone of the actors as outstanding in ability. All the parts were well chosen and well carried out. Particular mention is really due Ronald Hubbs, who carried the heavy part of "Seventeen," to Hehama McKee, who had the difficult role of Lolo Pratt, and to Marg Egan as little sister, Jane Baxter.

Following the first scene in act II the high school girls of Miss Sara Huntington's domestic art class, gave a style show of "Sixteen Now and Long Ago." The girls for the most part wore costumes made in the class. The "long ago" dresses with their long trains, their high necks and puff sleeves gave an amusing contrast to the short sleeved dresses of "Sixteen Now." At the close of act three Frances Oberly gave a violin solo and the orchestra gave two selections.

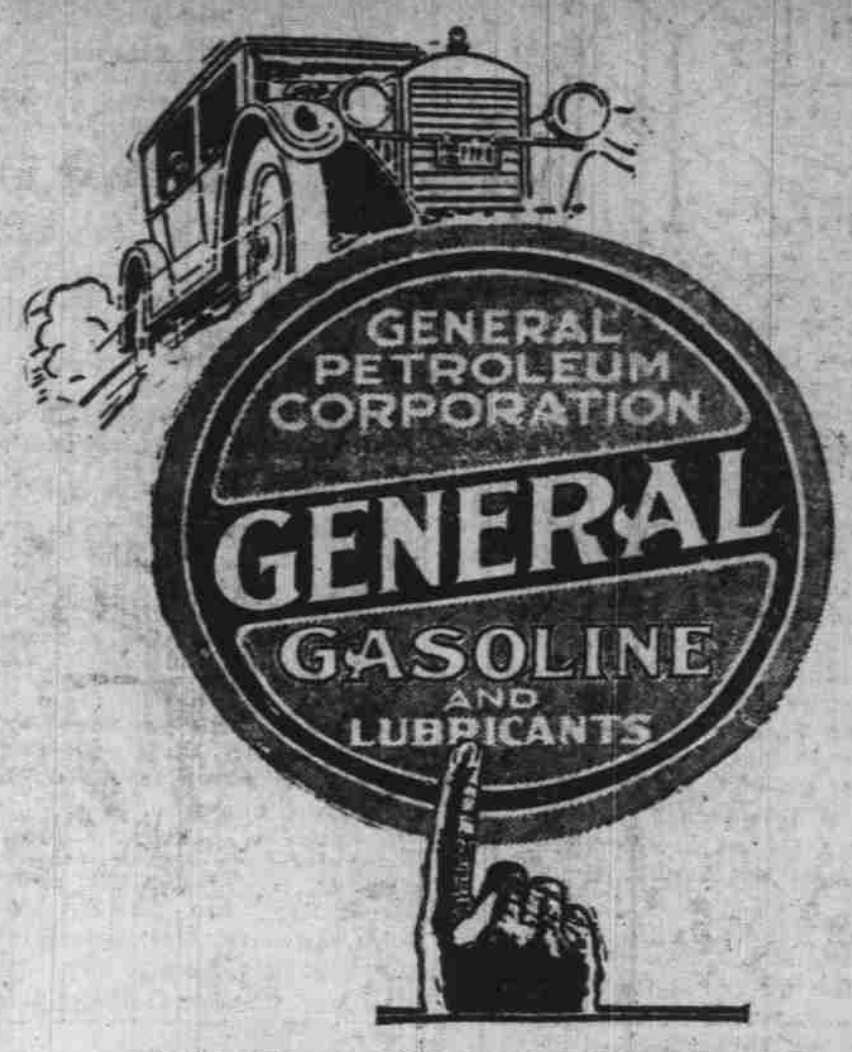
