Oregon trail, on Emigrant hill, in Umatilla county and surfacing between Coquille and Myrtle Point, in Coos county, was ordered.

## CHILDRENS FARM HOME MAKES FINE PROGRESS

W.C.T.U. INSTITUTION NEAR CORVALLIS IS SUCCESS

Christian Home Crowded To Capacity With Many More Waiting to Enter

The success and growth of the childrens Farm Home should be of interest to every citizen of Oregon, to the child lover from a humanitarian viewpoint, to the taxpayer from the economic.

The Farm home is the only non-sectarian institution in Oregon giving state wide service in the care of dependent children.

In Oregon today many children are practically without guardianship whose feet have not strayed from the path of right but many whom will if not cared for soon become delinquent. It is well known to students of dependent versus thrust from one to another class the charge upon the state for the care is quite or nearly quadrupled.

The Children Farm home of the W. C. T. U. undertakes to give a real Christian home to dependent children to the full capacity of the cottages they are able to build with funds entrusted to them and they will build as fast as these funds permit. There are now three "homey" cottages housing eighty-one happy children on the farm near Corvallis. One more cottage is under way, another will be built soon. However a tithe of the children for whom application is made cannot be cared for.

Women's clubs are vying with the W.C.T.U. in energetic support of the home while fraternities have been most generous and still we are far, far from the goal of caring for every needy child in the state. Several have named the home on their bequests and we are grateful for this but we wish more would give their money now and themselves see the happiness and safety they will be the means of bringing to Gods little ones.

## DEBT IS SAID OVERPAID UNITED STATES DECLARED TO HAVE RETURNED EXCESS

WASHINGTON, May 29.—(Associated Press.)—Official records to substantiate his statement that the United States paid France \$250,000 more than it borrowed from that government in 1775-76, are cited in a letter addressed by Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee to the editor of the London Observer.

The communication made public tonight, was occasioned by the publication of a letter from the author of a biography of Beaumarchais, expressing surprise over the senator's assertion that the loan, which was made by the French government through Beaumarchais, had been over-paid by a very considerable sum.

"In 1881, under the direction of Mr. Windom, secretary of the treasury, a most thorough and detailed study was made of all national loans of the United States from July 4, 1776 to June 30, 1880," Senator Borah stated.
