

SENATORS ANNEX GAME FROM PORTLAND TEAM

LEAD OVERCOME LATE; FINAL SCORE 5 TO 3

Several Good Clouts Are Made During Contest; Vancouver Is Here Today

Salem Senators took the lead over the Port of Portland players yesterday and defeated them by a score of 5 to 3, in one of the closest played games of the season at Oxford park.

The fireworks started when Leptick knocked the first ball over good and hard, Stephens fanned, Barrett walked, Kerns hit to right for a single, thus scoring Leptick, making the first run for the visitors. Later Barrett came around the home plate and piled up the second score.

When the Senators took their place at the bat, Coleman made a home run when he clouted the pill over the right field fence.

The Portland players kept the single lead until the fourth inning when Leptick knocked a homer over the left fielder. They seemed to have advantage of the Senators all the way through. They could not get across Peterson.

In the eighth the Portland players held their own, but when the Senators took the bat, things went to pieces. Peterson, who had been pitching an underhand ball failed to put it across and the Salem boys scored heavily.

Larham singled out to second, Bouton went out to second on a pass ball. Proctor got on, Coleman singled to right scoring Larham, Coleman going to second on play to plate, Steers singled through short stop, Keene knocked a homer over right field scoring Steers. In all the Senators brought in four runs.

The ninth was not much and merely served to end the game.

Play in the inter-state league will continue today, with the Vancouver, Wash., team meeting the Senators here this afternoon.

LEWIS DEFEATS MUNN IN BRILLIANT MATCH

"STRANGLER" RETALIATES FOR DISPUTED KC BOUT

Munn Wins First Fall; Great Size Is Declared Severe Handicap

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., May 30. (By The Associated Press.)—Ed "Strangler" Lewis, claimant of the world's heavyweight championship retaliated for the disputed defeat Wayne "Big" Munn, former Nebraska athlete administered to him in Kansas City last winter when he defeated the matman here late today.

Munn, taking advantage of his heft and fresh strength took the first fall from Lewis in 24 minutes and 55 seconds.

His great size proved more of a handicap than an advantage in the remaining falls, however. Lewis wore him down by the application of an even score of headlocks and took the second fall in 17 minutes and 12 seconds.

Lewis trotted in for the third and deciding fall, while Munn ambled slowly down the aisle, an indicator to the knowing ones that the third fall was to be over very quickly. It was seven headlocks applied in seven minutes and 12 seconds that erased the black mark against Lewis' record, noted by the disputed Kansas City defeat.

By winning the match Lewis eliminated one of the three claimants of the championship, while the field was being further narrowed at St. Louis in the contest between Stanislaus Zybuzko and Joe Stecher. Lewis also took the major portion of a \$30,000 purse and retained ownership of his \$10,000 gold diamond-studded belt, emblematic of the heavyweight championship.

PHILADELPHIA, May 30.—(By Associated Press.)—The university of Southern California Trojans won the 49th annual intercollegiate track and field championship on Franklin field today, scoring 33 points in the 15 events and placing men in seven events with a well balanced combination of track and field performers.

Princeton was second with 29½ points and Yale third with 26½. Georgetown finished fourth with 23 points and Pennsylvania fifth with 22.

M'TIGUE IS DEFEATED BY PAUL BERLENBACH

NEW LIGHT HEAVYWEIGHT CHAMP WINS ON DECISION

Youth Gradually Wears Down Older Opponent; McTigue's Fight Game

YANKEE STADIUM, NEW YORK, May 30.—(By Associated Press.)—Paul Berlenbach of Astoria, N. Y., became light heavyweight champion of the world here tonight by outpointing Mike McTigue, who gained the title from Battling Siki in Dublin three years ago in a 15 round bout. It was a case of a slugging youth meeting a middle aged boxer with a great defense.

In the first three rounds Berlenbach was the master, but from the fourth to the seventh it seemed as if McTigue had regained his championship form. His awful left was continually in Berlenbach's face and the Astoria man seemed unable to penetrate his wonderful covering.

In the last part of the fight the youth and strength of Berlenbach gradually wore down his opponent. In the eighth Berlenbach cut McTigue's lip with rights to the head and in the next two rounds opened cuts over his left eye and his ear.

Berlenbach, fighting the 26th bout of his professional career, said after the match that he had been unable to attain his best condition, claiming that he had been threatened with diphtheria while training. He failed to show lack of condition once he swung into action.

The crown transferred tonight to the dark thatched head of the former Olympic wrestling champion had been held for only two years by McTigue, who had lifted the title from the conqueror of Georges Carpentier—Battling Siki.

Only once before had McTigue stepped into the ring with a challenger to a decision. In his fight he had boxed to an unpopular draw verdict with Young Stribling in Georgia. Later he lost newspaper decisions to both Stribling
